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
# **Higher education in Europe 2020**

- Progression routes and recognition of prior learning and experience
- Outreach to under-represented groups, guidance and targeted financial support
- Reduce drop-out

# E. Creating the right governance and funding conditions

- Sufficient, efficient and well-targeted funding
- Empowering institutions to play to their strengths
- Effective governance and funding systems are a pre-requisite for success in the preceding areas
  - **Example EU Actions:**
  - -U-multirank more transparency
  - -Analysis of impact of funding models



# Erasmus for All: meeting new challenges

- Europe 2020 investing in education, knowledge and innovation for jobs and growth
- Need for more strategic approach to target our investment where we expect the greatest impact
- Relevance: link policy and programme show systemic impact by putting our money at the service of our policies
- Sustained impact at different levels: individual, institutional, systemic/policy
- Simplification, rationalisation

### Learning mobility of individuals

- Staff mobility, in particular for teachers, trainers, school leaders and youth workers
- Mobility for higher education student, vocational education and training students
- Master degree scheme
- Volunteering and youth exchanges

# What does it mean for HE?

- International opening of Erasmus: more mobility of students and staff between EU – non EU in both directions
- 2. <u>Joint Master courses</u>
  of high quality offered by consortium of
  EU/non EU universities to attract the very
  best students worldwide
- 3. <u>Student Loan guarantee</u> to boost degree mobility within Europe





# Cooperation for innovation and best practices

- Strategic partnerships between youth organisations and other relevant actors
- ⇒Large-scale partnerships between education and training establishments and business
- IT-Platforms
- Cooperation with third countries

# What does it mean for HE?

- 1. Erasmus Strategic Partnerships: more intense cooperation between institutions.
- 2. Knowlegde Alliances: structured partnerships between HEI and businesses
- 3. Specific support with neighbourhood countries: More cooperation between universities for capacity building and more student and staff mobility.
- 4. Rest of the world: More cooperation between universities in the EU and rest of the world for capacity building.





# Support for policy reform

- Open method of Coordination
- ⇒EU tools: valorisation and implementation
- ⇒Policy dialogue with stakeholders, third countries and international organisations

- 1. Support the OMC, Higher Education Modernisation Agenda, Bologna Process
