Please note: due to the time-intensive logistics of the application processes for admissions, housing, visas & study permits, and the registration for courses, we will be firm on our application deadlines going forward from 2023. We request your support in timely submission of all documentation by the posted dates. (Some leniency will be allowed for Federal Government Scholarship Candidates, such as ELAP, SEED and Study in Canada recipients).

QUOTAS

- The total number of nominees to both campuses will usually not exceed 4 (four) exchange placements per year, with preference that students are distributed amongst our campuses (unless otherwise specified in the agreement).
- Where applicable, specific faculties may set a different quota as per their capacity requirements.
- Additional students are welcome as fees-paying visiting students (“Free-movers”) above the established quota and will be supported the same as those nominated for exchange.

COURSES AND REGISTRATION

- Home institution coordinators and students will select, sign, and submit preferred courses on the “Course Selection Form”
- Any changes made after submission of the form must be authorized by the home institution prior to registration
- Registration usually takes place about 4-6 weeks prior to the start of the semester
- Complete course descriptions can be found in our university calendar under the appropriate faculty or school:

- The recommended course load for an exchange student is between 3 and 4 courses (9-12 credits / 18-24 ECTS) per semester (for balance of academic and cultural experiences as part of the exchange).
- Graduate students are recommended to take no more than 3 courses per semester due to the increase complexity and workload of graduate-level courses. If required, graduate students can enroll in relevant undergraduate courses to complement their studies.
- We can accommodate the maximum 5 courses (15 credits / 30 ECTS) if absolutely required
- Due to course mapping for our Bachelor’s programs, it is rare and difficult to accommodate 5 courses in one subject area. For this reason, it is recommended that students choose an array of courses from several relevant and applicable faculties, schools, and departments as determined in consultation with their academic coordinator at their home (sending) institution.
- Many of our courses contain laboratory components that may add an additional 3-hours per week into one’s class schedule. For this reason it is not recommended to engage in more than 3 laboratory courses in any given semester.

VISAS AND IMMIGRATION

If studying in a program longer than six months, then students are required to have a study permit and depending on their country of citizenship they will also need to obtain either a visa or an eTA. If the program is less than six months then students will be required to obtain either a visa or an eTA and may apply for study permit.
