



Climate Change Theatre Action, launched in 2015, is a worldwide short-play festival put on every two years to coincide with the United Nations Conference of the Parties (COP) meetings. The original devisers of CCTA were Elaine Ávila, Chantal Bilodeau, Roberta Levitow, and Caridad Svich.

"[S]torytelling and live performance to foster dialogue about our global climate crisis create an empowering vision of the future and inspire people to take action." (CCTA)

Every second year, 50 professional playwrights spanning all continents, several cultures, and multiple Indigenous nations, are commissioned by CCTA to write a five-minute play about an aspect of the climate crisis based on that year's given prompt. This year the prompt was: "The Time Is Now."

Made available to organizers – such as the Centre for Intermediality Studies in Graz – around the globe, events of various kinds are set to engage audiences and promote actions. The festival runs from September 19 through December 20. After the conclusion of the live-performance festival, an anthology of the plays will be published, ready to keep the conversation going.

Six Polar Bears is a sharp, satirical comedy about media fabrication and the manipulation of truth by those in power. Using absurdity and exaggeration, Emerson exposes how governments twist undeniable facts for their own benefit. Inspired by Molière, Jon Stewart, and Monty Python, the play turns panic, confusion, and incompetence in those who occupy positions of authority into biting humor rather than heavy drama, inviting the audience to laugh while recognizing the seriousness beneath.

Alister Emerson is a New Zealand playwright and the Artistic Director of Duck Bunny Theatre, known for its satirical work critiquing corporate greed and political absurdity. His recent plays include *The Fridge* and *Ed Sheeran Tastes Like Chicken*, the latter addressing the endangered Māui dolphin and shortlisted for the NZ Playmarket Plays for the Young competition.

ABOUT THE PLAY

Eat the Rich is a short, satirical climate-crisis play set in the Atlantic Ocean in 2025. Three orcas – one who builds consensus, one who follows rules, and one who embraces rebellion – debate power, justice, and how to respond to human exploitation of the oceans. Their conversation highlights themes of wealth, pollution, environmental destruction, and the illusion of human ownership over the planet. The play is fast, funny, and furious, combining humor and critique in equal measure.
