I. Introduction

I.1. Who offers international legal resources online?

- public entities (governments, parliaments, courts, IOs ...)
- academia (universities, related research institutions, their libraries)
- media (from journals to scientific publications)
- companies
- non-commercial organisations (NGOs, parties ...)
- private entities, institutions, professors ...

I.2. What can I use the internet for?

- general research („first acquaintance with the topic“)
- research for primary literature (treaties, laws ...)
- research for secondary literature (books, journals ...)
- topical developments (news, blogs ...)

I.3. How to start my research?

- search engines (e.g. yahoo, google, google scholar)
- meta search engines (e.g. www.surfwax.com, www.copernic.com, Google Custom Search Engines (CSEs))
- databases
- newsgroups, discussion fora
- social networking sites (e.g. StudiVz, Facebook)

I.4. The research „musts“

- Know where to look!
- Clearly define your research topic!
- Know the research operators (Boolean operators: ((x and x), NEAR, NOT, AND), proximity, * (wildcard))!
- Don ‘t get lost following obscure links („Wikipedia“ illness)!
- Organize your results (using bookmarks etc.)!
- Contact researchers directly

I.5. Citation

- Usual citation rules with the URL

z.B.: Maarten van Dijck, „Discussing Definitions of Organised Crime: Word Play in Academic and Political Discourse“, HUMSEC Journal 1 (2008), 65-90, http://www.etc-graz.at/cms/fileadmin/user_upload/humsec/Journal/van_Dijck_OC_Definitions.pdf (10 October 2010)

Hint: Turn long URLs into short ones by using, e.g.,
<http://www.tinyurl.com>: <http://tinyurl.com/2vlu6l2>

- Add the date of last visit (or of last control visit)
- Use the website title
UN, Working Groups Assumed by the Human Rights Council,
<http://www2.ohchr.org/english/bodies/chr/workinggroups.htm> (20.4.2009)
- Save essential and non-permanent looking websites locally

I.5. Citation (2)

- Never, ever, ever, ever, ever plagiarize
- Plagiarism is an insult against your own intelligence, your colleagues and the principle of academic honesty
- Teachers use the Internet, too
- University of Graz has introduced an anti-plagiarism software
- In some countries you may be expelled (!)

II. 1. Non-specific search engines

www.google.com

- well-chosen research terms
- similar words
- avoid spelling mistakes
„human security“ „international law“
(and while you’re at it: check your own Google© profile)

- digitalisation of „real“ books
- full-text search
- example „human security“

- You are looking for a certain article, but do not remember the exact title?
- Let's have a look at an example!








NYTimes **articles** about test scores in college, but not the SATs, written between 2008 and 2010.

How To Google It



Don't ask Google questions. Think about how an answer would be phrased, and search for that (ie, never search for 'What is the air speed velocity...').

filetype:

Searches only results of the file type you designate. Can use for pdf, doc, jpg, etc.

intitle:

Only shows results with that word in the title (in this case, 'velocity').

filetype:pdf air speed intitle:velocity of *swallow

*

Replaces itself with common terms in your search (in this case, Red Rumped swallow and Lesser Striped swallow will both be searched, along with many others).

- Research exclusively academic and scholarly work
- Let's have a look at an example!



What You Want

Papers about photosynthesis by Dr. Ronald L. Green and Dr. Thomas P. Buttz.



How To Google It

author:

This will search for papers by Green rather than papers involving the word 'green.'

“ ”

For more specific results, you can put the authors full name or initials in quotes.

author:green photosynthesis “tp buttz”

Just like a normal Google search, this is where the topic you're looking for goes.
