The University of Graz is looking for

Two PhD student positions in Philosophy (Theories of Justice and Ethics) in the Research Project “Historical Injustice - The Consequences to Justice of Changed Circumstances”

(30 hours a week; fixed-term employment for the period of three years; positions to be filled preferably starting October 2nd 2017 in Graz, Austria)

The project (funded by the Austrian Science Foundation) investigates the normative consequences of past injustices. The project's main question is: Should justice have a forward-looking orientation, backward-looking orientation, or something in between, and what are reasons to re-evaluate the orientation with respect to how we ought to respond to the consequences of historical injustices? The project aims to develop an integrated approach that would include prospective distributive elements (the focus on the needs of present day individuals), historical entitlement elements (the validity of past claims and their presumed continuation), and structural injustice elements (such as how social structures might disadvantage certain groups beyond distributive injustices).

The PhD students will work on a research topic which contributes to answering the general research question of when does the supersession of historical injustice occur or not occur: Under what conditions is it no longer just to (fully) correct a historical wrong due to changed circumstances?

The research project is offering two PhD student positions, with contracts starting in fall 2017 for three years. The positions come with social and health insurance. In addition the project provides funds for conference participation, visits, and research stays abroad.

Applicants must hold a Master's degree (or equivalent) in philosophy. Knowledge in English at level C1 is expected. Knowledge of German is not required to begin the position.

The applications have to contain the following documents in pdf format:

- a motivation letter including indication of the research topic, including proposed case studies of historical injustice, you will want to pursue. The supervisors Univ.-Prof. Dr. Lukas Meyer (the University of Graz) and Prof. Timothy Waligore (Pace University) propose that research analyses how changing circumstances could alter the consequences for justice with respect to at least two of the following four:

(1) property holdings, (2) connection to land following mass expulsions, genocide, and/or settlement, (3) group identity and cultural rights, and/or (4) sovereignty. A set of cases would be examined, one example of which might be the Saami, Palestinians, indigenous peoples, and Sudetendeutsche (or other cases the applicant may have expertise/interest in).

- an abstract in English of the master thesis and a pdf of the thesis

- a Curriculum Vitae including information on previous work experience and publications and a transcript of records, evidence for knowledge in English at level C1 or higher

- two letters of recommendation.

The selection procedure will commence immediately after the application deadline, with interviews to be expected in August. All communication, including interviews, will be conducted in English.
