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INTRODUCTION

2020 was a year that further advanced the digital transformation. The ZIM's profile meshed perfectly with this development and the creation of digital representations of cultural heritage data and objects has been advanced in 2020 in a large number of projects funded by the EU (H2020, Erasmus+, DARIAH ERIC, ERC), Austrian funding agencies (FWF, funding programmes of the Austrian Academy of Sciences), and funders outside of Austria (Mellon Foundation, British Academy), as well as regional funders (Styria Region) and direct contributions from individual research partners (University of Roehampton, University of Salzburg).

The ZIM has thus been able to consolidate its position as an internationally renowned research unit while maintaining its function as a local partner for a large number of third-party funding projects in the Faculty of Humanities. Leif Scheuermann's ERC win, only one year after his habilitation in 2019, speaks to the world-class research being done here. The ZIM is the first humanities department at the University of Graz to succeed in such a prestigious application. In the past year, relations with the partners of the University's field of excellence "Dimensions of Europeanisation" and the research network "Human Factor in the Digital Transformation" have also been further developed (cooperation with the Centre for Jewish Studies, and the Institutes for Pedagogical Professionalisation, for System Sciences and for Economics).

The year 2020 began with BMBWF events on the state of the digital transformation in Austria. The ZIM was actively involved in those events, one of which was explicitly planned and organised at the initiative of ZIM („Digital Humanities in Österreich“ 24.1.2020). In the national research landscape, ZIM maintained its leading position, with Walter Scholger taking the role of spokesperson for the CLARIAH consortium (the Austrian organisation within the EU DARIAH network) and with the beginning of the project "Digital Transformation of the Austrian Humanities" led by the University of Graz (BMBWF funding), while Helmut Klug and his team are still working on the final phase of its predecessor project, KONDE. Walter Scholger's activity on the board of the Association of Digital Humanities in the German-speaking world (DHd), Martina Scholger's leadership of the Technical Council of the TEI, and the review activities of many staff members for international research funding agencies and international publications are further signs that the ZIM enjoys an excellent reputation within the scientific community.

2020 will certainly be remembered by most as the year of the pandemic - and our Centre was able to directly contribute in line with its research objectives, with a review of museums' digital responses to COVID19 by Chiara Zuanni and Sabrina Melcher (<http://digitalmuseums.at/>). However, COVID19 also caused us problems: the upcoming conference of the International Association of Digital Humanities, the "DH Conference", hosted by the University of Graz, was postponed from 2022 to 2023; we had to cancel events, and had to cancel many of our own planned appearances. International guests such as the JESH Fellow Zarko Vujošević (Belgrade) and the doctoral students from our cooperation with the University of Potenza could only be reached via video conference. These collaborations were nevertheless personally and academically enriching!

Despite all the hurdles, the conversion to online teaching has been successful, so that digital formats for teaching and examinations are now established. The first students of the Master's programme, which was established in 2017, have earned their academic degrees, and we would like to offer our collective congratulations. The ZIM is also pleased and honoured that some graduates are taking up doctoral studies with us. In 2020, we were able to modernise the curriculum of the Master's programme "Digital Humanities" and are pleased that the discipline is now part of all curricula at the Faculty of Humanities as elective subject. This once again underlines the bridging function of ZIM and the digital humanities in general, which continuously picks up on current technical developments and integrates them meaningfully into research work in the humanities.

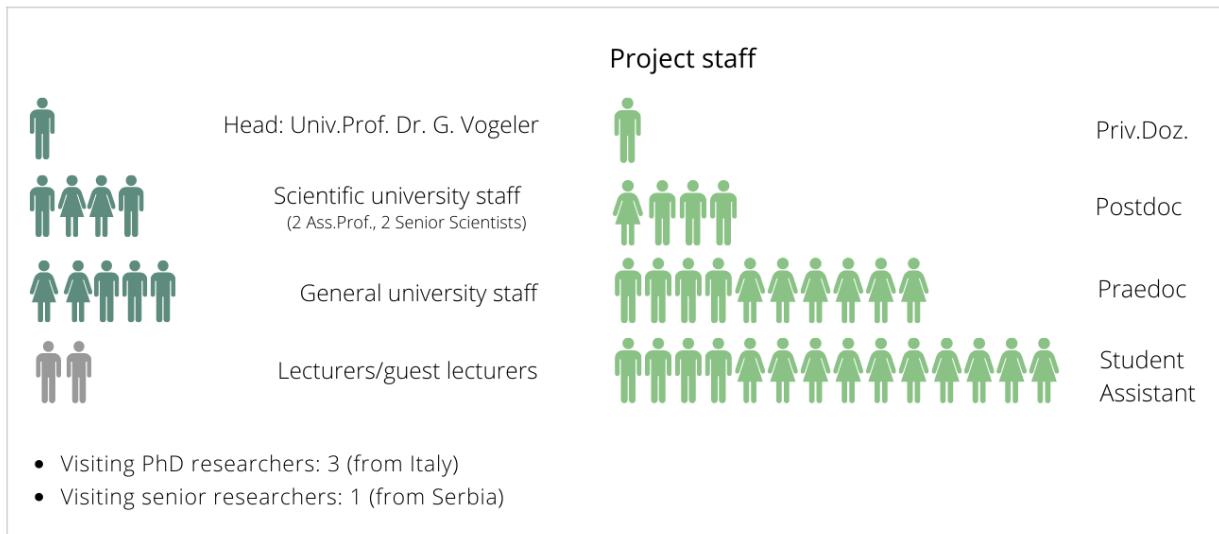
The acquisition of third-party funding in particular would not be possible without the hard work on the technical infrastructure of the centre, the GAMS. In 2020, it also led to our recognition as a CLARIN-B-Center in the European research infrastructure for language resources, thanks to the tireless work of Gerlinde Schneider. This infrastructure functions smoothly thanks to the faculty's generous endowment of non-scientific staff and the dedicated support of the university IT. Johannes Stigler has taken on the task of adapting GAMS to new technical developments as part of an extensive migration project and is tirelessly driving it forward. With his retirement in 2021, he will leave a sizeable gap that can only be filled by the team spirit of all scientific and technical staff. This is all the more our concern because GAMS, as a major outcome of the research activities at ZIM, formulates the humanities faculty's answer to the pressing questions of research data management and preservation.

2020 was a year that further advanced the digital transformation - and ZIM played its role responsibly and with international respect. At the core of this success is the ZIM staff - and so I can look ahead to 2021 with optimism.

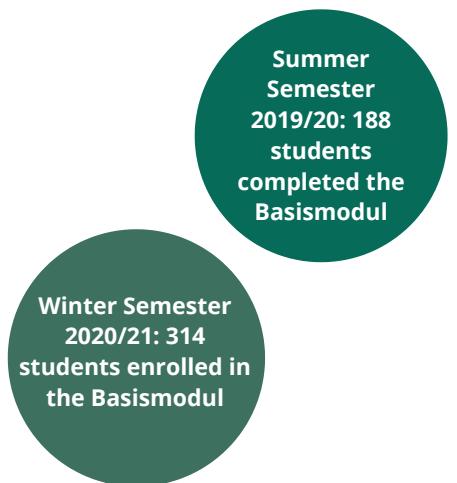

TEACHING

Basismodul

The Basismodul is a module for undergraduates in the Faculty of Humanities, introducing them to key themes in the digital field, with a focus on the digital transformation of humanities research. For example, it covers the functioning of the World Wide Web; media theory and the Web 2.0; information finding for humanities research (e.g. through online archives and library services); digital safety and security; copyright and data protection; cultural institutions in the digital space; digital research methods for textual sources and digital editions; social media research.



Certificate "Informationsmodellierung"

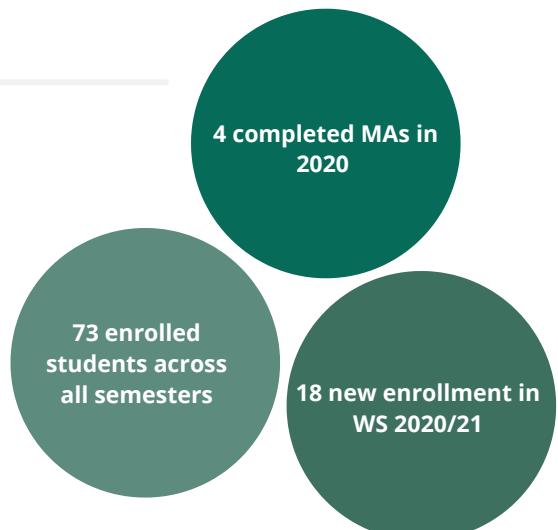
7 certificates awarded in 2020

Students at the Faculty of Humanities can take this module as part of their elective subjects. The module offers an overview of electronic media and their technological, social and historical implications, and an introduction to digital methods for working with textual sources and with semantic web technologies. At the end, the students receive an official certificate by the University of Graz to document their additional qualification.

MA Digital Humanities

ZIM launched the first MA in Digital Humanities in Austria in 2017/2018. It is a two years MA organised in five modules:

- Module A: Introduction to the Digital Humanities
- Module B: Data structures and Programming
- Module C: Specialised digital methods
- Module D: Sustainability and Research Data
- Module E: Theories and uses of digital humanities research



Doctorates

ZIM participates in the Doctoral Programme "Digital Transformation", led by the Human Factor in Digital Transformation research network at the University of Graz.

Besides, there are currently 5 PhD candidates at the Centre for Information Modelling, working on a digital edition of alchemical texts (Sarah Lang), versioning systems in digital humanities (Martina Bürgermeister), multimodal digital editions (Hans Clausen), Linked Open Data between the humanities and life sciences (Christian Steiner), and Knowledge-based Resource Discovery for data in the humanities (Christopher Pollin).

INFRASTRUCTURE

The Centre for Information Modelling develops GAMS (Humanities Asset Management System), within the framework of a large number of collaborative projects with both internal and external university partners, and taking into account the specific requirements of humanities research.

GAMS is a fully OAIS (Open Archival Information System)-compliant asset management system for the management, publication and long-term archiving of digital resources from the Humanities. It enables scholars, researchers and students to manage and publish resources, with a permanent identification and enriched with metadata.

GAMS was first certified as a trusted digital repository in alignment with the principles of the Data Seal of Approval in 2014. Since 2019 we carry the CoreTrustSeal. GAMS is also registered with the Registry of Research Data Repositories.



Since 2019, ZIM is one of around 20 CLARIN-B Centres. CLARIN stands for "Common Language Resources and Technology Infrastructure" and it is the European Research Infrastructure Consortium (ERIC) providing access to digital language data for scholars in the social sciences and humanities.

CLARIN B-Centres are Service Providing Centres and constitute the core of this ERIC. These are units that offer access to resources, services, and tools on a sustainable basis and have passed a series of strict requirements, guaranteeing their conformity to the ERIC.



RESEARCH SPOTLIGHT

Digital Asset Management

This research area focuses on the archive and presentation of humanities research data, also with the development of the GAMS infrastructure.

Stefan Zweig digital catalogues and makes available online materials (manuscripts, typescripts, notebooks, diaries) relating to the work of Stefan Zweig, now dispersed in multiple archives in Austria, Israel, and the United States. The project was led by the Literature Archive Salzburg and ZIM was the technical partner, responsible for the digital archiving of the data with the application of Web of Data technologies.

The project *Picturing Migrant Workers' Lives* contributes to expand the existing *Visual Archive Southeastern Europe* (VASE), in cooperation with the University of Basel, and it aims to develop a visual archive of photographs and postcards.

Digital Editions

Examples of projects exploring the representation of humanities data are:

- A digital edition of the Acts of the Imperial Diet of Regensburg in 1576, in collaboration with the Bavarian Academy of Sciences.
- The *Digital Edition Publishing Cooperative for Historical Accounts*, looking to the potential of developing broad standards for producing semantically enriched digital editions of accounts.

This research area focuses on the representation and analysis of humanities sources and text corpora, drawing on semantic web technologies and the research strand on digital asset management.

ZIM projects draw also on different digital methods to develop digital analysis and research approaches. An example are the two projects that were funded in the ÖAW "goldigital" call:

Distant Spectators: Distant Reading for periodicals of the Enlightenment (PI Martina Scholger; with the Institute for Romance at the University of Graz and TU Graz) uses stylometric, network, and sentiment analysis, as well as topic modelling, to trace the evolution of topics and styles in multilingual texts from the 18th century.



Becoming Urban - A Geoinformationsystem for the city of Graz in the long 19th century (PI Leif Scheuermann) is instead using GIS to digitise older maps and research textual sources documenting the evolution of the city of Graz in the 19th century, in collaboration with the GrazMuseum.

Digital Museology

This research area focuses on the digitisation of cultural heritage, the digital transformation of museums and their impact on cultural audiences.

Projects in this area focus on the:

- Digitisation of cultural heritage: using 3D and multispectral technologies (through two work packages in DiTAH).
- Digital skills in museums: the Erasmus+ project *Digital Culture. Improving the Digital Competences and Social Inclusion of Adults in Creative Industries* is developing a MOOC contributing to digital literacy training.
- Digital engagement research: for example, in the HFDT-funded project on the use of museums digital materials in education during the pandemic.

Science Communication

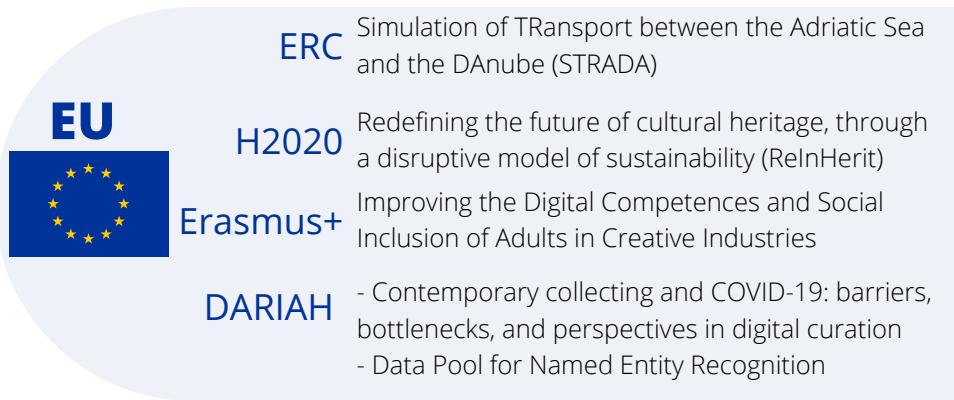
Helmut W. Klug is leading the FWF project *Cooking Recipes of the Middle Ages: Corpus, Analysis, Visualisation*. Additional FWF funding, for the project *Science Ink*, enables the communication of digital humanities research methods to a broader audience.

Impact

Chiara Zuanni led the development of a map of museum digital initiatives during the pandemic, which has been included among key resources for cultural organisations by major international organisations (ICOM; NEMO; Europeana).

PROJECTS

ZIM is currently leading, or participating in, a series of research projects funded by the European Union (with Leif Scheuermann winning an ERC Consolidator Grant in 2020), by the Austrian Government (with Georg Vogeler leading a consortium of universities in a flagship project funded by BMBWF), by the Austrian Science Fund (FWF), and by a series of other international, national, and regional funders.
