# PREFACE

A lot has happened at ZIM, in 2021. In autumn, our long-time Head, Ass. Prof. Dr. Johannes Stigler, retired. Johannes established and continued to build up the ZIM since it was still a centre. With GAMS, he gave it a technical infrastructure that enjoys an international reputation, and with a steady hand he selected staff who have cultivated and preserved the spirit of doing excellent work while standing together through many institutional changes, so that even the most recent changes, with ZIM becoming an Institute, have not been able to throw the Centre for Information Modelling off course. Hence, it could be easily overlooked that the first professorship for Digital Humanities in Austria has now become a permanent §98 professorship (since February 2021). It could also be overlooked that the ZIM team has increased six-fold during his tenure. Users of our resources hosted in GAMS might also not notice that their projects will be delivered by the fourth iteration of our humanities asset management system in 2022.

The public did notice, however, that ZIM was able to acquire a second ERC grant in 2021. Under the title "From Digital to Distant Diplomacy", I and a team of seven fellow researchers will seek to contribute to the digital transformation of manuscript research. The success of our ERC proposals has strengthened us as a team and as a faculty. We are happy to support our colleagues in this.

The ZIM team has also changed in 2021, through growth and through moves, as is common in academic institutions: Leif Scheuermann has taken up a professorship in Trier, graduates have started their careers outside the University of Graz, student assistants are concentrating on their studies, staff members have changed institution or department. Good luck, Franz, Martina, Vera, Sabrina, Marie, Alex, Astrid, Unmil, Hans, Verena, Leif and Gerlinde! We hope to welcome some of you back again when doctoral theses will start or project proposals will be approved.

But staff members also have rejoined: Sarah Lang has finished her dissertation on "Digitally decoding alchemical aliases. Polysemantic annotation and machine reasoning using the corpus of the iatrochymist Michael Maier (1568-1622)" and, after research stays as a Beckman Fellow at the Science History Institute Philadelphia (USA) and as a Research Fellow at the Boltzmann Institute for Neo-Latin Studies in Innsbruck, has started a position at ZIM as a PostDoc.

ZIM's international outreach is also visible in the fact that Bernhard Bauer has come to us from Maynooth (Ireland), having been awarded an MSCA Fellowship. Another new member of the team is Lucija Krušić, who has moved to ZIM from the Graz University of Technology and once again underlines the Digital Humanities' role as a bridge and mediator between Humanities and computational studies. Out of the many committed students, a few have recently joined us as staff members. A warm welcome to ZIM to all of you!

ZIM staff have also attracted attention for their excellent teaching, like Christopher Pollin in his introductory courses in computer science, and for their exemplary commitment to the infrastructure so necessary for our work, like Gunter Vasold and Fabio Tosques, who tirelessly face up to technical change and do far more for the modernisation of GAMS than would be expected from their job profile: the university has recognised their outstanding work with the Anton Schelnast Prize.

The ZIM naturally radiates in the multitude of projects and project partners that we realise together with our partners at the University of Graz. 2021 also saw the addition of several new projects that reach far beyond the university. For example, the cooperation with the Graz Museum in the BeUrb project has been successfully completed, we continue to cooperate very well with Bernhard Geiger from the KNOW Center beyond the DiSpecs project term, a pioneering digital edition is being created in cooperation with the Historical Commission at the Bavarian Academy of Sciences in Munich, we are part of the Digital Publishing Cooperative funded by the Mellon Foundation under the leadership of the University of Virginia, and we are leading the national flagship project "Digital Transformation of the Austrian Humanities" (DiTAH).

The national and international impact of ZIM is particularly due to Walter Scholger, who is advancing the Digital Humanities in Austria and in Europe, as spokesperson of the Austrian CLARIAH consortium, as organiser of national activities with broad impact such as the CLARIAH-AT Twitter showcase in April and as an important author of the national DH strategy, but also as a co-opted member of the board of the Association of Digital Humanities in German-speaking countries (DHd) and collaborator of various European and worldwide DH activities. As "Mister DH2023", he will maintain this status - and we can look forward to Graz becoming the focus of global DH activities in 2023 as the host of the annual conference of our disciplinary international umbrella organisation ADHO.

A lot has happened in 2021 - a lot will continue to happen at the Centre for Information Modelling - and I am not surprised, with this dedicated and creative team pulling together to do excellent factual work for meaningful digitisation in the humanities.

- Research on the effects of digitisation on questions, methodological approaches and epistemological processes in the humanities as well as the use of digital methods in culture and society.
- Collaboration and digital research support in the humanities, in particular in relation to the maintenance and further development of the logistical and technical infrastructure (GAMS) for the long-term availability of digital research outputs from the humanities.
- Training young researchers in the field of digital humanities.

## Research focus

### Digital Asset Management

This research area focuses on the archive and presentation of humanities research data, also with the development of the GAMS infrastructure.

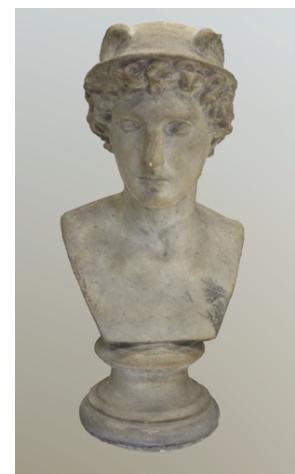


### Digital Editions

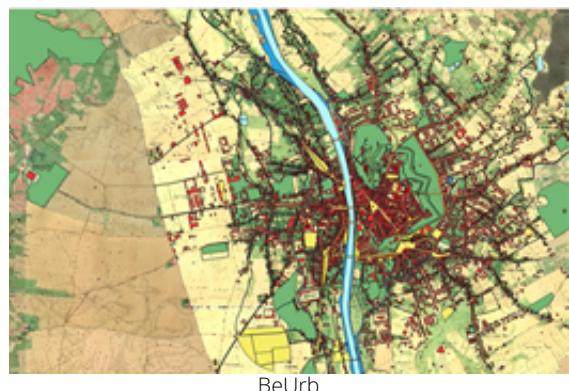
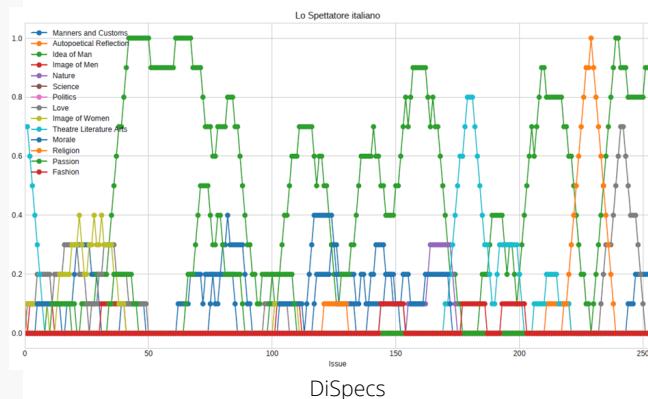

# INFRASTRUCTURE

The Centre for Information Modelling develops GAMS (Humanities Asset Management System), within the framework of a large number of collaborative projects with both internal and external university partners, and taking into account the specific requirements of humanities research.

GAMS is a fully OAIS (Open Archival Information System)-compliant asset management system for the management, publication and long-term archiving of digital resources from the Humanities. It enables scholars, researchers and students to manage and publish resources, with a permanent identification and enriched with metadata.

GAMS was first certified as a trusted digital repository in alignment with the principles of the Data Seal of Approval in 2014. Since 2019 we carry the CoreTrustSeal. GAMS is also registered with the Registry of Research Data Repositories and OpenDOAR.



Since 2020, ZIM is one of around 20 CLARIN-B Centres. CLARIN stands for "Common Language Resources and Technology Infrastructure" and it is the European Research Infrastructure Consortium (ERIC) providing access to digital language data for scholars in the social sciences and humanities.

CLARIN B-Centres are Service Providing Centres and constitute the core of this ERIC. These are units that offer access to resources, services, and tools on a sustainable basis and have passed a series of strict requirements, guaranteeing their conformity to the ERIC.

# TEACHING

## Basismodul

The Basismodul is a module for undergraduates in the Faculty of Humanities, introducing them to key themes in the digital field, with a focus on the digital transformation of humanities research. For example, it covers the functioning of the World Wide Web; media theory and the Web 2.0; information finding for humanities research (e.g. through online archives and library services); digital safety and security; copyright and data protection; cultural institutions in the digital space; digital research methods for textual sources and digital editions; social media research.



## Certificate "Informationsmodellierung"

8 Certificates awarded in 2021

Students at the Faculty of Humanities can take this module as part of their elective subjects. The module offers an overview of electronic media and their technological, social and historical implications, and an introduction to digital methods for working with textual sources and with semantic web technologies. At the end, the students receive an official certificate by the University of Graz to document their additional qualification.

## MA Digital Humanities

ZIM launched the first MA in Digital Humanities in Austria in 2017/2018, and since 1.10.2021 the Curriculum was renewed.

It is a two years MA organised in five modules:

- Module A: Introduction to the Digital Humanities
- Module B: Data structures and Programming
- Module C: Specialised digital methods
- Module D: Sustainability and Research Data
- Module E: Theories and uses of digital humanities research



## Doctorates

In 2021, Sarah Lang has successfully concluded her PhD with a thesis titled "Alchemische Decknamen digital entschlüsseln: polysemantische Annotation und Machine Reasoning am Beispiel des Korpus des Iatrochymikers Michael Maier (1568–1622)". Currently, there are six PhD candidates at ZIM. They work on versioning systems in digital humanities (Martina Bürgermeister), multimodal digital editions (Hans Clausen), Linked Open Data between the humanities and life sciences (Christian Steiner), and Knowledge-based Resource Discovery for data in the humanities (Christopher Pollin), Lucija Krušić (computer linguistic), and Sebastian Stoff (sustainability and DH-Software). ZIM also participates in the Doctoral Programme "Digital Transformation", led by the Human Factor in Digital Transformation research network at the University of Graz.

# DH CRAFT

The Digital Humanities are located at the intersection of the humanities and computer science. DH aim to research the development and application of digital methods in the humanities. At ZIM, projects that meet the specific requirements of the domains of origin in the humanities are implemented in this context. The focus is particularly on the development, use and reflection of digital methods for formulating and answering subject-specific research questions.



Within this highly focused niche, there is a need for project implementation (data modelling, data analysis, databases, web, software and workflows development), consulting (data management plans, funding applications, digital long-term archiving, project management) and teaching/training. Digital Humanities Craft OG, as a spin-off of ZIM, tries to fill this gap and offers IT services and consultancy in support of research.

This is made possible thanks to funding from Unicorn Graz, which supports university employees on their way to self-employment with its "Start-Up Workshop" funding programme. Christian Steiner and Christopher Pollin, both doctoral students in digital humanities, were able to found their company in February 2022 thanks to this excellent funding programme.

# NETWORKS

ZIM is active in a series of networks and its staff contributes to national and international associations.

## European Research Infrastructures

ZIM is a CLARIN-B centre, active within the DARIAH-EU ERIC, where it participates in different working groups with leading roles.

ZIM (with Walter Scholger) is also co-leading with the ÖAW the development of CLARIAH-AT, the consortium of institutions that coordinates and promotes Austrian activities in the European research infrastructures CLARIN (Common Language Resources and Technology Infrastructure) and DARIAH (Digital Research Infrastructure for the Arts and Humanities).



## Digital Humanities Associations

ZIM will be hosting the 2023 Digital Humanities conference by ADHO, the Alliance of Digital Humanities Organisations.

Besides, ZIM members are active within the German, Italian, and Austrian digital humanities associations and, in 2021, have presented at their annual conferences, participating also in their scientific committees.

In addition, ZIM is active in the Research Data Alliance and in the Text Encoding Initiative community. Martina Scholger is Chair of the TEI Technical Council.
