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### **Director's Editorial**

### **Structural Positioning**

This report covers the activities of the *Center for Inter-American Studies* (C.IAS) in the period of 2018 to the present. C.IAS was established in 2006/07 (at the time as the *Center for the Study of the Americas*) with a mandate to develop Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz in terms of **research**, **teaching**, **collaboration**, **out-reach**, and **service**.

This report documents the activities of C.IAS within a **four-year period** as well as providing an opportunity to reflect on its **15-year-existence** in terms of **past developments**, **present performance**, and **future goals**. As part of its **institutional commitment** to the **University of Graz** and its **Faculty of Arts and Humanities**, this evaluation of its **mission** in terms of research, teaching, outreach, and service will document the many **achievements** of the Center as well as determine its **next development steps**.

The past 15 years have shown that C.IAS has succeeded in its attempts to **reconceptualize traditional approaches**, not only in terms of **transnational** and **trans-regional methods** for an analysis of a continent, but also in terms of an **interdisciplinary** and **interregional approach** to **European-American** research.

This report is a renewed expression of **commitment to the original goals** that were drafted **(a)** by an **external evaluation board** conducting the first university-wide evaluation in **2006**, as well as **(b) recommendations** of the center's external evaluators in **2014/15**. In 2006, the recommendations of the evaluation board were to establish a **structure** to guarantee that the strengths of the University of Graz in terms of the **region of North-, Central- and South-**

America, and the Caribbean should not only be made visible, but reinforced in order to further develop research, teaching, collaboration, out-reach, and service within an interdisciplinary and trans-regional context. In the 2014/15 assessment, evaluators of the Center suggested concrete measures to strengthen C.IAS in terms of its mission.

The founding of the Center in 2006/07, established interdisciplinary research on the Americas (in relation to Europe) at the University of Graz, and C.IAS represents the only Inter-American Studies Center in Austria, and one of the few within the European context. Strongly committed both to the original recommendations of the external university-wide evaluation of 2006, and the newly defined goals by the university through the evaluation of 2014/15, the Center for Inter-American Studies has worked hard to establish **interdisciplinary** and inter-regional networks as well as developing new methods to conduct interdisciplinary research. As this report shows, the Center has managed to become a **focal point** for collaboration and connections and to develop **new** tools and methodological approaches. This document shows how Inter-American Studies has developed as a new field at the University of Graz, and has centered Western Hemispheric Studies in terms of methods, approaches and theories. By looking back and evaluating, this report presents an outlook for the future. Starting from a small base, it documents an impressive **output of activities** in research as well as teaching and cooperation fueled by enthusiasm and vision, and thus offers a frame of reference and orientation for the years and work to come.

#### What is the Center about?

C.IAS is a research center that engages in an **interdisciplinary analysis** of **new conceptual approaches** which redefine the Americas by exploring **historical, economic, political, social and cultural contexts** of these regions, thus leading to a **European transregional perspective**. By building **intraregional relations** based on **research, teaching, and out-reach**, new possibilities of collaboration and mobility can be created, offering the University of Graz as a Central European institution **new potential** for working with American and European institutions of higher learning within a **Western Hemispheric approach**.

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### Research Areas ("Forschungsfelder")

To facilitate academic activities of *C.IAS Researchers*, three distinctive research areas were conceptualized. This was done in an effort to not only provide the optimal environment possible for current projects, but also to set the direction for future research endeavours.

#### Research Area 1

### Inter-American Cultures, Histories & Literatures

Academic Lead: Ao. Univ.-Prof. Dr. Roberta Maierhofer & Dr. Christian Cwik

Long before the arrival of Christopher Columbus, millions of people had already populated the double continent of the Americas and its offshore islands. Life in the Americas gave rise to different cultures growing out of their respective environments, which existed simultaneously, but without contact with the "Old World" of Europe, Asia, and Africa. In an effort to research the inherent cultural complexities and global implications of these regions and their history, while also addressing the widespread Eurocentrism found in academic studies and discourse, but also literatures focusing on the geographic region of the Americas, the research area Inter-American Cultures, Histories & Literatures was formally established at the Center for Inter-American Studies.

The academic inquiry into the Americas as a region of cultural and historical interest at the Center for Inter-American Studies is organized into three distinctive branches. Firstly, the field of Inter-American histories and cultures is explored through the consultation of archival material and literature, both before and after the initial contact with European voyagers and settlers. Secondly, the lasting effects of European and Eurocentric "discovery", "conquest", and "exploration" on the Americas up to the present day are analyzed from an Inter-American perspective. The focus within this branch lies on the impact of different historical colonial powers, such as Spain, Portugal, England, the United Kingdom, France, Netherlands, Denmark, Sweden, and Germany, on the Western hemisphere and its Indigenous population. Another point of interest are different systems of slavery and injustices, which are investigated and mapped using theoretical methods of cultural, historical, and literary studies in an effort to gain insight into the many-faceted implications of displacement of people in the Americas. The third branch of this research area is dedicated to the historical developments of decolonization from the revolutionary process in British-North America in the 1770s to current Anti-Colonial movements against French, Dutch and British Colonialism as

well as US-Imperialism. The overall aim of this research area is to sharpen the view of interlocal, interregional and interstate relationships to obtain a better understanding of the issues and tensions of today stemming from the contested histories of the spaces of the Americas.

In the winter term 2019/2020, an **international lecture series** focusing on Inter-American History and Culture was established in cooperation with the Association of Continental American and Caribbean Studies (Konak Vienna). The lecture series offers talks and presentations by researchers and experts to provide students with an opportunity to engage with this field of research.

In summer 2020, a subdivision of the **Amauta Library** of the Association of Continental American and Caribbean Studies (Konak Vienna) was established at the Center for Inter-American Studies at its new location (Elisabethstraße 59/II). Students and researchers are free to consult the vast collection of literature.

Within the research area *Inter-American Cultures, Histories & Literatures*, the Center for Inter-American Studies offers a certificate for *Inter-American Cultural Studies*. The curriculum of this certificate provides students, who have an interest in the geographic and cultural region of the Americas, with the opportunity to enter this area of research and expertise through courses, which approach the cultures, histories and literatures of the Americas from a variety of different academic perspectives and disciplines.

A Master's Module titled Western Hemispheric Studies in the Humanities: Communication, Culture, Geopolitics is currently being developed. This program is conceptualized as an addition to the Additional Qualifications Program of the University of Graz. The module aims to extend the academic field of Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz, providing a platform for further inquiry into matters of Inter-American Studies.

A **Doctorate Program** titled *Interdisciplinary Studies of Latin and North America* (*Western Hemisphere*) is currently in development. The academic program is intended to be of interfaculty and interdisciplinary nature, involving departments of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities (GEWI), the Faculty of Law (REWI), and the School of Business, Economics and Social Sciences (SOWI) of the University of Graz. The program, formally situated within the research area *Inter-American Cultures*, *Histories & Literatures* of the Center for Inter-American Studies, aims to provide post-graduate students with an opportunity to pursue their research interests in the Americas, the Western hemisphere and their global cultural and historical implications.

#### Research Area 2

### Inter-American & Intersectional Approaches: Gender & Generations

Academic Lead: Ao. Univ.-Prof. Dr. Roberta Maierhofer

Within the research area Inter-American & Intersectional Approaches: Gender and Generations, C.IAS follows an interdisciplinary and inter-regional perspective of a research area that is not only relevant as a field of study, but carries the weight of immediate social, political and cultural relevance due to demographic change and gender transformations. Thus, this socially relevant topic also fulfills another mandate of the University of Graz, which, as an institution of higher learning, aims for public service and outreach, and seeks to provide answers to current relevant questions.

Critical analyses of the intersections of gender and generations allow for subversive deconstructions of normative concepts. In this context, stereotypical models of gender are redefined from new perspectives of the ambiguity of living and being. This cultural ambiguity enables an analysis of the social functions of images of gender in order to provide a basis for interdisciplinary exchange on feminist knowledge. The focus of this research area is on cultural and literary representation of gender and generations and its intersecting characteristics drawing onto feminist theory. The research area is also expanded by its **application in the educational context** and the aim to contribute to the development of inclusive didactic approaches that foster the critical engagement with intersectionality. Theoretical foundations from intersectional feminist theory will be used in the Center's *Narrative Didactics Research Group* to approach the questions of narratives in education from an intersecting perspective.

By focusing on intersectionality as a theoretical and methodological basis for studying interdisciplinary and inter-regional topics, this research area allows us to draw conclusions about connections relating to the history of ideas, and offers a new approach to literature and culture. So far, few studies have attempted a theoretical positioning of the topic. This research area is grounded in a theoretical approach developed by Roberta Maierhofer at the beginning of the 1990s. "Anocriticism" is an approach in Age and Aging Studies based on Elaine Showalter's definition of "gynocriticism," which enables an understanding of what it means to be "aged by culture" - in Margaret Morganroth Gullette's term. Maierhofer uses the term "anocriticism" to express an interpretational approach that validates individual experience of age and aging in resistance

of normative assumptions. As feminist theory distinguishes between sex and gender, so should a distinction be made between chronological age and the cultural stereotypes associated with old people, which would help escape the confining binary opposition of young and old, female and male. Starting with the premise that age – similar to race, class, and gender – does not flow naturally or inevitably from the individual's anatomical body, anocritical scholarship analyzes the way age identity is constructed in literature and in society, for both young and old. By determining in what way "youth" and "age" come to have certain meanings at a particular place and time, and by stressing the necessary interrelatedness of these meanings, a new understanding can be reached. This understanding suggests that "young" in a given society depends in part on being different from what is "old" and what is "old" on not being "young." By placing literature in a social, cultural, and political context, existing disciplines and traditional paradigms can be reconstructed. When analyzing texts from the Americas, the topic of aging can trace lines of identity that are both divisions as well as crossings.

As part of this research area, the project *Gender and Age/Aging in Popular Culture* as part of the the *Elisabeth-List-Fellowship for Gender Studies* from the University of Graz was carried out from June 2020-June 2021. Within this project, the intersections of gender and generations as represented in popular culture, particular in contemporary literature and music were investigated together with local and international Senior and Junior Fellows. Thus, the intergenerational dimension was not only in the focus of the research but also present in the project participants. The fellowship resulted in an international, interdisciplinary online symposium as well as a follow-up edited volume by Roberta Maierhofer, Nicole Haring and Barbara Ratzenböck (forthcoming 2022) which will be published with transcript (Bielefeld).



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#### Research Area 3

# Inter-American & Interdisciplinary Research: Media, Digitalization & Society

Academic Lead: Dr. Barbara Ratzenböck

Working, learning, getting news, shopping, leisure, catching up with family and friends — as more and more aspects of our everyday lives happen online, research on the **social practices, structures, and consequences of digitalization**, as well as their cultural implications, becomes increasingly important. How and why people use different kinds of media depends on various factors, such as socio-economic resources, technological infrastructure, location, and social norms related to gender and generational position, but also individual interests. A thorough understanding of media engagement thus requires multiple perspectives and interdisciplinary investigation.

In the period of 2018-2021, several research projects at C.IAS explored current media practices. Under the lead of Roberta Maierhofer and Barbara Ratzenböck, C.IAS coordinates the Austrian survey of the **ACT Cross-National Longitudinal Study: Older Audiences in the Digital Media Environment** (actproject.ca/act/longitudinal-study). This study collects data on older adults' media use in multiple countries (Austria, Canada, Denmark/Finland, Israel, Romania, Spain, and The Netherlands) to explore intersections of generational belonging and media practices in the digital era. Conducted as an online survey, the project targets older Internet users aged 60 plus. The first wave of data collection took place in 2016, including 10,527 respondents across all participating countries (1,627 of them from Austria). In 2018 and 2020, wave two and three of the survey were carried out, with 1,079 and 795 repeated participants in Austria respectively. Asking questions about media repertoires and common use of both digital and traditional media, the survey offers insight into older adults' media practices.

At C.IAS, intersections of generational belonging and gender in the context of media are of particular interest in research. Completed in 2020, the PhD project of Barbara Ratzenböck titled *Media Relations: How and Why Older Women Care for Information and Communication Technologies* examined how women aged 60 plus engage with 'old' and 'new' ICTs and how this relates to lifetimes of experience with technology change. Although older women are a diverse group and thus have diverse experiences with ICTs, the study was able to identify multiple patterns of their ICT use. Notably, older women's engagement with new ICTs involves a "double logic of care." Either they use new ICTs to care for

others (particularly their families), or, on the contrary, explain to be too busy caring for others to engage with new ICTs. However, independently of whether they use new ICTs extensively in retirement or not, their understanding of ICTs most often revolves around the topic of caring for others.

Having started in 2018 and still ongoing, the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (mascage.eu) investigates intersections of masculinity and aging in the context of media. The interdisciplinary project brings together six countries (Spain, Ireland, Austria, Estonia, Sweden, and Israel). Led by Roberta Maierhofer, Team Austria conducts both cultural studies analysis, particularly of literature, as well as a sociological case study. The latter investigation, conducted by Florian Pirker, Barbara Ratzenböck, and Roberta Maierhofer explores lived experiences of older men as well as their impressions of media representations of old age. The aim of the case study is (a) to understand more fully social constructions and representations of older men in Europe with a specific focus on ageist stereotypes; (b) to explore men's experiences of and attitudes to ageing across different European cultures; (c) to gain a deeper understanding of ageing masculinities in and through cultural representations; and (d) to share the results of this project with other researchers, practitioners and policy makers. For this purpose, online focus groups are conducted with older men.

### **Narrative Didactics Research Group**

The Narrative Didactics Research Group is a research group at the Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz, founded in 2019, which studies and disseminates **innovative approaches and methods** that use stories and narrative practices to facilitate **learning and teaching** processes in education. The idea of Narrative Didactics is to expand the scope of didactics by providing alternative methods and tools to critically engage with the challenges of our times through **narrative practices**. The research group is part of *Research Area* 3: *Inter-Interdisciplinary Research: Media, Digitalization & Society.*

The members of the Narrative Didactics Research Group aim to collaborate in the development of a didactic framework, which specifically focuses on narrative practicies and how these can be best implimented in the classroom, but also in other learning and teaching environments. The research group and its activities are shaped by interdisciplinary collaboration between the individual members, who utilize their own academic backgrounds and research foci to contribute to the collaborative project. An overview of their respective fields of expertise within and approaches to research on Narrative Didactics can be found in the following sections.

### Feminist Narrative Practices & Intergenerational Storytelling Academic Lead: Mag. Nicole Haring

The idea of feminist narratives goes back to the long standing feminist tradition of consciousness raising groups and the concept of "the personal is political". The idea here is to use it as an educational tool to produce narratives and then investigate them through an intersectional feminist lens to ultimately **deconstruct gendered stereotypes and assumptions** that reside in these narratives. **Digital stories** as well as literary narratives are an ideal tool to be used in educational settings to critically engage with narratives through an

intersectional feminist lens. The method of the "Intergenerational Feminist Mic" was developed by May Chazan from Trent University, Canada, during an intergenerational workshop with women activists in Montreal through the ACT Research Project (https://www.agingactivisms.org/). Using digital storytelling as a tool to produce **knowledge transfer across generations** and deconstructing the common perception of older people as 'wisdom donors' was the aim of the project. The developed feminist methodology is a valuable tool for education as well as it stimulates a critical discourse of certain topics across generations.

### **Diversity Pedagogy**

### Academic Lead: Mag. Dagmar Wallenstorfer

Due to globalization and migration causing society to become increasingly diverse, we see ourselves confronted with new and unknown challenges. In order to counteract the forming of parallel societies and promote a multicultural way of living, people need to learn how to approach and live with differences. The starting point for this learning process is the classroom, which is in many ways a microcosmos. Numerous societal issues can be witnessed when 25 children or teenagers come together every day in one room. The promising outcomes of digital storytelling in terms of cultural awareness, critical thinking and understanding have been discussed by scholars worldwide. Digital storytelling can be used as a tool in classrooms to communicate differences, foster understanding and affection, and promote acceptance and appreciation for diversity in the process.

### Literary-Enactment-Process (LEP) Academic Lead: Mag. Christina Pöckl

This project promotes reading literature for students through **a newly developed approach** termed the *Literature-Enactment-Process* (LEP), where students can gain access to and comprehend narratives and associated inquiry topics through a range of phases, with **performative methods** as a pivotal point. As a pedagogical tool, these enactment strategies are embedded in a larger procedure that combines individual and collaborative comprehension processes. Since enactments, reflections, and follow-up tasks (writing in and out of role, new media creations) are fused, literature and the experiences with it become visualized, substantiated and shared.

At the University of Graz, LEP was tested with current and future teachers as well as language arts students, proved itself in practice and was positively evaluated as an interdisciplinary teaching method in the language arts classroom.



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### Multicultural Narratives in Education Academic Lead: Mag. Nina Reibenschuh

The school is a diverse place – children, adolescents and adults with different social, societal, and cultural backgrounds and beliefs come together. As a result, education plays a key role in the successful negotiation of different identities. Literary narratives can be used as a vehicle for teaching **cultural awareness** and **tolerance in the classroom**; pupils will engage with other cultures and thus perceive it as a valuable contribution to their own identity formation. The aim of the critical analysis of literary narratives is to support appreciation and understanding among pupils. Furthermore, it enables them to reflect critically on their own as well as foreign cultures. In addition, literary narratives not only enable pupils to revisit history, they also provide them with the opportunity to engage with certain concepts prevalent in the narratives that transcend time and are still present in society.

### **Digital Storytelling**

#### Academic Lead: Mag. Andreas Schuch

Digital storytelling is a new method for learning and teaching in which storytelling is combined with digital technologies. A digital story is a shortform video in which someone narrates and shares a personal, cultural or other aspect of their life with others. This process encourages reflection processes about oneself and others as well as working with a specific topic on language, digital, intercultural and many other levels. The level of complexity concerning technology- and topic-related aspects can easily be adjusted according to the context in which a digital storytelling project takes place. First experiments of combining multimedia elements with storytelling performances can be traced back to California during the 1980s. In 1994, the Digital Media Center was founded in San Francisco, which later became the Center for Digital Storytelling and, in 2015, simply StoryCenter. The Center has played an instrumental role in developing and popularizing the practice of digital storytelling, which was initially limited to mostly the rapeutic and expressive applications. Scholars and educators worldwide have since discovered and written about the numerous benefits of educational digital storytelling. However, digital storytelling has not yet reached the classrooms and university courses in German-speaking countries.

### **C.IAS Team**



**Eva Katharina Bauer** is currently enrolled in the Joint Master's Programme for English and American

Studies at the University of Graz. She supports both, the Institute of English Studies and the Center for Inter-American Studies in the capacity of a student assistant. Her academic interests mainly focus on socio- and psycholinguistics as well as on Feminist and African American literature.



Christian Cwik is a Post-Doc at the Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz, Austria.

He holds a PhD in history and philosophy with an emphasis on African and lewish diaspora, slave trade and slavery as well as Shoah history. In 2005, he won the Science Award of the City of Vienna. Before joining the Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz in 2019, he was a lecturer at the University of the West Indies in Trinidad and Tobago, invited professor at the University of Havana, the University of Cartagena de Indias in Colombia and professor for Colonial Ibero-American history at the Bolivarian University of Venezuela in Caracas. Furthermore, he was substitute professor at Cologne and Erfurt University in Germany, taught seminars at Harvard and Yale University, and was invited as a guest lecturer to Columbia University, New York. He has published several books and articles on interment and repression during the Shoa and its aftermath.



Klaus-Dieter Ertler is Co-Director of the Center for Inter-American Studies and Professor Emeritus for

Romance Literature at the University of Graz. He earned a teacher's degree for secondary schools and studied Romance Languages and Comparative Literature at the University of Graz as well as Rouen, Bordeaux, Paris, Santander and Montreal. He holds a master's and doctoral degree in French and Spanish Philology from the University of Graz. He was Vice-President and President of the Association for Canadian Studies in the German Speaking Countries (GKS) as well as President elect and President of the International Council for Canadian Studies in Ottawa (ICCS).



Nicole Haring is a PhD Candidate at the Center for Inter-American Studies (C. IAS) at the University of

Graz. Austria. She holds two master's degrees, one in education (ESL/EFL & Geography) and one in English and American Studies, both from the University of Graz. From 2019-20, she received a Fulbright grant for the University of Oklahoma, USA, to work as a foreign language teacher in German and to study. Recently, she held a fellowship at the University of Graz, working on gender and aging in popular (Elisabeth-List-Fellowship-Programme for Gender Research). As part of the Narrative Didactics Research Group, her research focus lies on storytelling. American women's literature, feminist theory, gender studies, age/ing studies, and education. In her dissertation, she is working on the tool of storytelling to highlight intersectionality in education. She is the co-founder of the C.IAS Inter. Reading Book Club and a researcher in

the project DigLit: Lit. Up Your Phones: A Digital Toolkit for ESL/EFL Classroom to Combat Social Inequalities in Times of Covid-19 Crises. Currently, she is tasked with developing the project IncludeAge: Transforming Digital (Dis)Engagement for CHANSE—Collaboration of Humanities and Social Sciences in Europe.



Heike Hartung is an independent scholar in English Studies and teaches at the University of

Potsdam and the University of Rostock. She is currently employed as a Researcher of the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge) at the Center for Inter-American Studies, University of Graz. She has earned her PhD in English Studies at the Freie Universität Berlin and her PhD Habil, in English Literature and Cultural Studies at the University of Potsdam. In her publications she applies the methods of literary theory and cultural studies to the interdisciplinary fields of aging, disability and gender studies. She is the author of the monograph Ageing, Gender and Illness in Anglophone Literature: Narrating Age in the Bildungsroman (2016) and the edited collection Embodied Narration: Illness. Death, and Dying in Modern Culture (2018).



Theres Hinterleitner has been part of the C.IAS team since July 2020 as **Project Manager**. Before joining

the Center for Inter-American Studies, she worked for more than 15 years as Director of the Dean's Office of the Faculty of of Arts and Humanities at the University of Graz.



Erlis Laçej is a PhD Candidate at the University of Graz, Austria. She recently completed the

Joint Master's Degree from the University of Graz and Ca' Foscari University of Venice in English and American Studies. Since fall 2020, she has supported the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge) as a project assistant. She was the co-editor of Radical (Dis) Engagement: State—Society—Religion, the sixth volume of the Off Campus: Seggau School of Thought series.



Roberta Maierhofer is Professor of American Studies and Director of the Center for Inter-American

Studies at the University of Graz, Austria. From 1999 to 2011, she held a series of Vice-Rector positions for International Relations (1999-2003), International Relations and Affirmative Action for Women (2003-2007), and International Relations and Interdisciplinary Cooperation (2007-2011). 

The world's population is ageing: one in four people are expected to be over the age of 65 in the next two decades, making 'the senior citizen' the largest demographic group in the Western World. At the time that we are expected to live longer, there has been a proliferation of digital devices, information technologies and mediated systems of communication that network populations globally.

Ageing, Communication, Technologies (ACT) addresses the transformation of the experiences of ageing with the proliferation of new forms of mediated communications in networked societies. It considers how 'digital ageism' - the individual and systemic biases that create forms of inclusion and exclusion that are age-related - operates in subtle ways, and suggests strategies for change. Our objectives are to: transform public discourses and understandings of age and ageing; include older adults as active agents and collaborators in our research agenda to develop appropriate languages, methods and ways to communicate intergenerationally and intra-generationally; develop curricula and teaching methods; provide a lasting collaborative platform for the theorization and critical analysis of the relationship between ageing and digital worlds; draw on the interdisciplinary expertise of our researchers who are working in a wide range of national and transnational settings; foster an inter-institutional sharing of resources and expertise on ageing and media for students, faculty, community workers and selected industry partners; and finally, to **create strong institutional partnerships** and connections across academic institutions and non-academic organizations likewise concerned.

From May 4-5, 2018, the Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz hosted a **Student Conference** with the aim of gathering students from different disciplines and backgrounds to exchange their research from an interdisciplinary, interregional, and transnational perspective. Due to contemporary developments, such as **migration and flight movements** as well as ensuing political debates that demand stricter **border policies** and **surveillance**, the topic of borders has recently (re-)gained political momentum.

It was the aim of this student conference to transcend these narrow political definitions associated with the term, to understand 'borders' in a broader sense as encompassing several meanings or layers of meaning. Thus, participants were encouraged to develop new associations with and understandings of the term. 'Borders' can refer to any dividing line, including national, political, and geographical borders as well as boundaries between ethnic, gender, national, class, or age identities. In order to transcend these borders, possible topics addressed, but were not limited to the following questions: Why do borders exist? How do they manifest themselves? What are their meanings for different societal actors? How are they perceived, portrayed and represented? The focus lied on the human actors involved, drawing attention to those who are affected by these processes and those who have initiated them. The conference invited participants to transcend disciplinary borders and to question and re-define assumptions and ideas.

The Comparative Healthcare in Austria, Slovenia and the U.S. program offers the opportunity to explore healthcare through a comparative lens, using mostly Austria but also Slovenia as specific examples to contrast the European system with the United States. 

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# Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge)

The primary objective of this research is to analyse social constructions of ageing masculinities and/through their cultural representations in contemporary European literatures and cinemas. The research project specifically seeks: (a) to understand more fully the interrelationship of masculinities with a variety of social issues specifically associated with men's ageing: older men's health; social inclusion and exclusion; sexualities and affective relationships; and ageist stereotypes; (b) to explore men's experiences of, and attitudes to, ageing across different European cultures, exploring their commonalities and differences, at both national and transnational levels; (c) to gain a deeper understanding of ageing masculinities in and through cultural representations; and (d) to share the results of this project with other researchers, practitioners and policymakers to help them devise strategies and policies designed to promote greater gender and age equity. If age studies focus on youth and gerontology studies of either older women or "ungendered" portraits of ageing (Saxton and Cole 2012), this project will explore the gendered specificities of men's ageing. Applying to the cultural analysis an interdisciplinary corpus of masculinity and age studies, the project seeks to make an impact by crossing the traditional Social Sciences-Humanities boundary and by proving that not only do social notions of masculinity shape their cultural representations, but they simultaneously affect the social (de-)construction of both gender and age.

Within the project, Heike Hartung and Matthew Sweney of Team Austria focus on cultural representations of masculinity and aging in contemporary

**European literatures and cinemas**. As many contemporary European writers and film directors have entered maturity, older characters have become increasingly present in European literatures and cinemas, which makes the present study both timely and necessary. The study will prove that literary and cinematic masculinities do not simply reflect social images of ageing but often provide more varied and nuanced portrayals of ageing and late life. While some social theorists underestimate the numerous paths through senescence, the analysis of such representations will help show that, as in any other stage of life, there are multiple experiences of men's ageing, which are subject to variously complex and changing influences, both national and transnational.

The second part of the MascAge project is the conducting of **(online) focus groups** with older men, with each national project team deciding on the pace of the process, while maintaining a consistent methodology and materials used (films, commercial ads, literary texts). Within the focus groups, societal portrayals of ageing masculinities were the main topic. The groups were conceptualized as reading and film groups on the topic, which participants linked to their own life histories and experiences. This led to log book writing and group discussions, which in turn served as material for analyses. 3-5 focus groups (8-10 people in each group) were conducted by the research teams, focusing on specific ageing movies/texts from the different regions.

The project will conclude in February 2023. So far, it has met all the proposed outcomes, including the research activities, publications, presentations, and academic and science-to-public activities.

The research project *Interpreneurship: Styria Meets the USA* brings together the **Styrian entrepreneurship** and the "American Entrepreneurial Spirit", in areas such as research, teaching, and practice by means of interdisciplinary and intercultural forums and formats which address different target groups. Economic thinking and business practices do not exist in a cultural vacuum, but are rather an integral part of culture. Under American leadership – a discipline that sees itself as an interdisciplinary mediator – the project Interpreneurship puts a series of "key actions" in research, teaching and the public outreach into practice, in collaboration with its several intra-university (e.g. Center for Inter-American Studies; Center for Entrepreneurship and applied business administration), local or regional (WKO Styria, Styrian Government) and international cooperation partners (U.S. Embassy).

Entrepreneurial thought and action, as well as its cultural appreciation, are not only a core component of the US national identity but are part of the Western outlook as a desirable ideal, due to the cultural-diplomatic dominance of the United States—which has developed from the "rags to riches" myth to the current start-up trend. Entrepreneurship has also experienced growth in its importance in the region of Styria, although the entrepreneur does not hold the same cultural status as in the United Status. From a cultural studies perspective, challenges of understanding and communication can be identified, which can be counteracted through adequate translation. "Translating" does not only mean overcoming linguistic barriers, but also the intercultural understanding and the explanation of often complex values.

European American Studies, which is understood as a transatlantic and interdisciplinary dialogue, offers an ideal perspective to understand America from an European perspective, but at the same time to see Europe – and the states and regions within Europe – through an American lens. With the aim of thinking, teaching, learning and practicing globalism in the provinces,

Interpreneurship utilizes untapped potential for cultural-economic knowledge transfer and cross-border entrepreneurship.

Particular attention was paid to **cultural and media consumption**, such as music and film, as well as cultural representations in contemporary European literary works. In this context, gender-specific experiences of men and women and their attitudes towards ageing in relation to media and music consumption was compared and a deeper understanding of contemporary and changing representations of age and ageing was gained in order to integrate age(s) into the human image. In addition, the question of how digital transformation processes influence women and men in different life and age phases was explored. The thematic focus of this Fellowship project lay in the question of gender and age/aging in the context of popular culture, especially music.

The project was closely related to the project *Gendering Age: Representations* of *Masculinities and Ageing in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas* (MascAge), so that the intersectionality (gender/age/race/class) of identities in Europe as well as in North, Central and South America could be further explored beyond its duration of 3 years.

The thematic focus of this fellowship programme is on the **question of gender and age(ing)** in the Central and Southeast European context. It focuses on the living situations and lifestyles of older men and women in selected Central and Southeast European regions, which were analysed on the basis of different data material, with a special focus on reflecting on the opportunities and challenges of a multi-method and interdisciplinary approach within the analysis. For example, the analysis of literary and filmic representations of gender and age were related to the results of survey studies. The role of **media consumption** in general as well as the **significance of newsocial media** for the living environment of older people and potentially existing gender disparities in this area were given special consideration. A comparative perspective to North, Central and South American regions allows to identify specifics of the Central and Southeast European region.

The combination of cultural sociological and cultural studies approaches allows a deeper understanding of the interactions between media representations of gender and ageing, socio-structural factors in the lives of men and women, as well as their attitudes and values.

January 2022 will mark the twentieth anniversary of the establishment of the Guantánamo Bay detention camps, after which they were used as a U.S. military prison just months after the terrorist attacks of 9/11 in 2001. Such anniversaries offer opportunities to pause, look back, and imagine the future anew, but what insights will this one foster? Shortly after detention operations involving suspected terrorists began at Guantánamo Bay, the late American Studies scholar Amy Kaplan referred to the U.S. naval base as "a location where many narratives about the Americas intersect" and speculated that it was an anomaly that could become a norm. In the almost two decades that have passed since then, the narratives that Kaplan refers to still call for analysis and discussion. Therefore, this conference invites participants to contextualize detention in terms of a broad typology of camps and camp-like institutions in the Americas: detention and internment camps, prisoner-of-war camps, labor camps, black sites, offshore detention centers, concentration and re-education camps, prison units, among others. Graz stands out as an appropriate environment for exploring these topics given its status as the first European Human Rights City. The aim of the conference is to facilitate interdisciplinary and intersectional exchange and discourse by featuring work that explores narratives of (in) justices, human rights, and solidarities in the Americas. The conference will be held from May 26 to 29, 2022.

In addition to exposing a variety of vulnerabilities, the COVID-19 pandemic has made us all all-too aware of our **entanglements with digital technologies**, as seemingly neverending video calls and remote teaching have joined technologies that feel nearly antiquated by now: emails, literature searches in databases, writing your latest manuscript in a word processor, drafting the budget for your next project in spreadsheets, preparing the slides for your next (online or face-to-face class)—our work is, in many respects, interconnected with the digital. While the "**digital turn**" has had a tremendous impact on academic work, it has also led to the emergence of **new objects of inquiry and methodologies**, ranging from the **digital humanities** and questions of **digital literacies** to video games, social media, slacktivism, and streaming platforms.

The conference *Digital Americas* sought to take stock of "the digital" within the context of American studies. We understand "America" broadly here—the United States, the Americas, and the Americas' global entanglements. Contributions of the conference addressed topics from digital pedagogy, digital methodologies, digital culture, and digital media as objects of critical inquiry, and digital scholarship. To highlight the digital aspects of this conference, it was held in both in real-time and asynchronously over the course of two weeks (October 21 - 22 & October 27 - 29).

As part of the *Graz International Summer School Seggau* 2021, which celebrated its 15th anniversary — this year due to the COVID-19 pandemic in a modified form as a hybrid (online and partially on-site) event with the title "Castle in the Cloud/s" — the *Digital Scientists Initiative* was held from July 4 to July 10, 2021 at Seggau Castle in Leibnitz, . Through the active engagement of the participants with the potential of **digital science**, new forms of scientific cooperation were established. The newly conceptualized approaches presented themselves to young academics and renowned international researchers within the new **communicative conditions and circumstances of hybrid events**, which led to the facilitation of a joint development of innovative solutions for current global problems. The pandemic and the associated digitalization push, breaks in social cohesion, demographic change and migration, but also economic inequality pose immense challenges for society in the present and the future.

Engaging successfully with these topics calls for innovative "Think Tanks" – a "collective brain" (Maierhofer), like the Digital Scientists Initiative, in which young scientists and experts from different disciplines come together through hybrid (online and partially on-site) formats in order to be able to use **new**, **productive cooperation models** to make the "state of the art" in research the common basis and then to develop ideas for new research projects with the highest possible social impact. Through the Digital Scientists Initiative, young researchers were invited to **deal with urgent questions of our time in an evidence-based manner** within an innovative, stimulating environment, to develop new relevant questions and creative solutions, and to communicate their insight to the scientific community and the general public.

### DigLit: Lit. Up Your Phones: A Digital Toolkit for ESL/EFL Classroom to Combat Social Inequalities in Times of COVID-19 Crises

Covid-19 has caused several challenges to our everyday lives, specifically affecting educational settings. With remote teaching and studying taking over, social inequalities were made transparent. Children from less privileged backgrounds experienced among the hardest set-backs due to the demand of modern technical devices, especially computers, laptops, and/or tablets with high speed internet to follow the new setting of the classroom. The economic inequalities posed an additional threat to their educational success and enhanced an extended broadening of the social and economic gap. Based on these experiences, the need for an easily accessible home teaching device has become evident in order to combat social inequalities in times of remote learning. The smartphone as an essential tool for everyday usage has often been neglected in the educational context as a handy teaching and learning device. The probability to access smartphones nowadays is higher independent of the socio-economic situation of children than to have various modern technological devices to facilitate remote learning. Specifically, in families with more than one child, the number of such devices and, thus, the children's accessibility to their learning material is limited. Therefore, smartphones provide an optimal tool to counteract this deficiency. Students' affiliation with smartphones can also be used to bridge the spheres of modern popular media and literature used in the ESL/EFL classroom. The engagement of popular apps in combination with young adult literary texts can promote literacy competences, as well as social competences that enhances critical thinking. The young adult literature used in the project will feature **voices of marginalized groups** to engage with the question of social and gender equity. It is the aim of this project to **create**  a tool kit to work on young adult literature with the use of smartphones to combat societal inequalities in times of Covid-19 and online schooling. The toolkit will include tasks where popular social media apps such as *Snapchat*, *Tik Tok*, *Instagram*, as well as *YouTube* will be used to bridge the literary text sphere with social medias and digital tools. Personal narratives as well as the use of English as a second/foreign language is one of the main goals.

DigLit is a **2-year international educational project** that aims at combating social inequalities and fostering critical thinking by engaging with topics of diversity and equality in the English classroom. Students will engage with young adult literature and the creation of digital narratives through the usage of applications on smart phones. As a result, the digital **DigLit toolbox** will be created consisting of a didactic guide, a collection of young adult literature suitable for the B1+ English classroom, as well as a collection of the created digital narratives throughout the project. The target group of the project are **ESL/EFL learners, students, and educators**. The Center for Inter-American Studies with Prof. Dr. Roberta Maierhofer together with Prof. Dr. Hermine Penz from the English Department of the University of Graz are the academic lead of the project working together with Ca'Foscari University of Venice (IT), University of Pécs (HUN), Ursulinen Gymnasium Graz (AUT), Liceo Scientifico Tron Schule (IT) and Pécsi Tudományegyetem Gyakorló Általános Iskola Gymnasium (HUN).





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### Let's Talk about Gender: Intergenerational Knowledge Transfer in Education

The educational system is a significant component of society and thus a major player in reproducing the societal and cultural norms. The persisting gender norms and stereotypes present in Austrian society are, thus, reproduced in educational institutions today. In order to contribute to the deconstruction of them, a broader approach is necessary. Therefore, this dissertation project proposes intergenerational storytelling workshops in combination with feminist literary analyses as a new cutting-edge epistemological and methodological approach to reflect and discuss gender norms and stereotypes and its reproduction in the educational **sphere** which ultimately contributes to the inequality of genders in society. The aim of this research endeavor is to use intergenerational storytelling in combination with feminist literature as a tool to critically reflect, discuss. and ultimately deconstruct gender norms and stereotypes in education by combating generational divisions and creating a knowledge transfer across generations. Furthermore, the dissertation project questions, on the one hand, how processes and strategies of gender norm construction in education can be identified, and how they influence both collective and individual intergenerational gender narratives. On the other hand, the question of which **methodologies** can be developed for interdisciplinary and intersectional research of the reproduction of gender norms in education will be tackled. With regard to these research questions, the development of a merging of methods from literary and cultural studies with qualitative research in the form of participatory action research is a crucial aspect of this dissertation and will eventually be the research method used to examine the research questions. The development of a new interdisciplinary research method will ultimately provide significant findings for the field of cultural

gerontology, education, feminist and gender studies.

Based on recent experiences with international research endeavors. our planned research activity is a Critical Narrative Research Hub which is a combination of our personal research approaches in the framework of "Critical Narrative Analyses". In this research activity, we intend to address the intersections of our three research focuses of gender, aging. and diversity in cultural studies through a critical narrative approach by using digital storytelling. In this hub, we will discuss the importance of narrative based research applied in the analyses of media narratives, literary narratives, and personal narratives, which will facilitate a transfer of knowledge and provoke further discussion. Ultimately, the result of the research activity foresees the creation of digital narratives through our guidance. Hence, based on the theoretical input provided by the research group, the participants will partake in a workshop, which will apply the theory to practice. This workshop is followed by the invitation to express thoughts and ideas in the course of a discussion round. The overall aim of this research stay is the sustainable exchange of knowledge and competences in the area of **critical narrative analyses** on an international scale and through an interdisciplinary lens. This transnational cooperation will support our academic development significantly and contribute to the immediate progress of our dissertations.

On September 15, 2021, five of the seven Central American Republics celebrated the 200th anniversary of their independence (bicentenario) from the Spanish Crown in 1821. The multidimensionality of the process requires a profound and interdisciplinary analysis due to the complex process of political emancipation with its multiple effects on the historical development in a cultural and ethnic enormous heterogeneous region. Scholars within Central America and beyond have pointed out the necessity of shifting perspectives. Many of them are based on new archival sources as well as new research methods, which also demand a critical revision of traditional historiography. Often historical discourses of the 19th and early 20th centuries have served as founding myths of the individual nation-states.

During the last decades, they were constantly deconstructed by different scholars. Recent studies in the field of **Global History** have contributed to a better understanding of this world region, which were discussed at the colloquium. This conference, which was held from October 14 to 16 2021 sought to bring together scholars to reflect on global, international, and transnational perspectives on the independence of Central America in 1821 and its impact until today. Visions, motivations, and perspectives from Central America reflecting on these changes with impact on the region until today were discussed in terms of political, social, and economic reorientations.

### IncludeAge: Transforming Digital (Dis)Engagement

More and more aspects of life – working, leisure, communication, health and other public services, but also activism and political engagement happen online. Even before Covid-19, societies had already become "digital by default" (Hill, Betts, and Gardner 2015:421). However, not all members of society can and/or want to partake in the digital world to the same extent. Particularly older adults are overrepresented among non-users of the Internet. In 2020, almost a third (32%) of EU citizens aged 65-74 had never used the Internet, in comparison to only 4% of individuals aged 16-24 (Eurostat 2021a). Varying levels of digital (dis)engagement of different population segments pose challenges for social cohesion. To counter social exclusion based on digital disengagement, this project explores visions of a digitally inclusive Europe by looking into cultural representations of digitalization (art, literatures, films, everyday media) as well as lived experiences and innovative ideas with regard to digital integration of European citizens, particularly older adults. In doing so, the IncludeAge project employs an interdisciplinary approach, combining perspectives from the humanities (cultural and literary studies) with input from social sciences (sociology and social policy). The humanities component will address the question of what we can learn about digital inclusion and exclusion from creative works and how they are able to inspire change by stimulating the imagination. The social science component of the project will investigate empirical realities of digital (dis)engagement, particularly investigating older adults' everyday (non) use of the Internet. In doing so, it will not only explore what older adults use the Internet for, but also examine how non-users of the Internet perceive their digital disengagement and how this affects their everyday life. In this process, the project will probe European citizens' innovative ideas for a digitally inclusive society.

### Critical Studies of Men and Masculinities in Europe: A Multi-National, Interdisciplinary Perspective (MascEU)

Traditionally, gender studies have focused on women, which is logical, as it is women who have historically undergone the worst effects of gender discrimination. Recently, however, increasing attention is being paid to critical studies on men and masculinities so as to underline the relational nature of gender(s) in society. Thus, this COST action aims at investigating masculinities from a multi-national, interdisciplinary and intersectional perspective so as to (a) better understand the interrelationship of gender **constructions** affecting both women and men; (b) challenge heteronormative and limiting gender stereotypes; (c) promote alternative narratives and perspectives on gender; (d) create cross-gender and intergenerational collaborations in post-Covid Europe. So as to explore the continued interaction between social constructions and cultural representations. the methods and strategies of the network will investigate masculinities in literary, film and media representations but also through qualitative interviews with men from different European regions so as to identify some of the main problems deriving from hegemonic masculinity in the ongoing struggle against gender inequality. By establishing a **network of researchers** from both the Social Sciences and the Humanities, this action aims to deconstruct unequal gender constructions and representations, but also provide new insights into alternative gendered practices and, ultimately, propose policy recommendations to both stakeholders and policy-makers based on the interdisciplinary findings.

As gender studies has historically focused predominantly on women, this COST Action will expand the corpus and approaches to create a new intersectional, multi-national, and interdisciplinary network that draws heavily on gender studies and feminist theory, but also fills the lack of research on masculinities studies, particulary in Europe. Despite the recurrent description of gender equality both as a *Sustainable Development Goal* (SDG) by the *UN* and as a societal challenge by the *EU*, specifically after the Covid-19 pandemic, many of the current *Horizon* 2020 calls for projects

seem to fail to take masculinities into account. Similar observations can be made of the current research in gender studies, where the oc-2021-1 4 predominant focus remains on investigating femininities and women. Thus, the innovative scientific potential of our project lies in investigating diverse perspectives on masculinities, and especially from both the Social Sciences and the Humanities, as scientific research has not translated into a cultural (especially literary and film) arena. MascEU will investigate specifically ageing masculinities and gender and sexual transformation processes with regard to masculinities and thus fill the void in transnational projects and research. In this sense, cultural representations will provide a space to explore and (re-)negotiate gender transformation processes, especially by mediating changing gender perspectives, sexual orientations and gender binary resistances. As many contemporary European writers (e.g., Jonas Jonasson, Tove Jansson, Antonella Moscati, David Trueba, Martin Amis, Julian Barnes. Hanif Kureishi, Arno Geiger) and film directors (Jacek Blawut, Isabel Coixet, Andreas Dresen, Michael Haneke, Mateus Luzar, John Madden, Igor Mirković, et al.) have entered maturity, older characters have become increasingly prominent in European literatures and cinemas, which makes the present study both timely and necessary. Similarly, many of these European authors and filmakers have successfully challenged heteronormative gender assumptions through their works. Additionally, the social sciences have focused predominantly on research on women's experiences, thus neglecting to explore gender in all its forms and shapes. This shortcoming will be tackled by this network so as to promote the exploration of gender-in particular masculinities-aiming to provide specific findings and practices that foster gender equality. Moreover, MascEU will prove that literary and cinematic masculinities do not simply reflect social images of gender but often provide more varied and nuanced portrayals of the same. The investigation of cultural representation through an interdisciplinary, intersectional and multi-national lens will thus help show that there are multiple gendered experiences and images of masculinities, subject to variously complex and changing influences, both national and transnational.

ClimAge is a multi-disciplinary, multi-sectorial, science-industry-policy international network of humanities, social sciences, health sciences, environmental sciences and engineering researchers, policy stakeholders, practitioners, and industry. The network is dedicated to the training of a new generation of researchers to enhance and develop the research understanding of older people in the context of climate change to form evidence-based policies, clinical practice, and industry solutions.

The overall goal of the network is to train professionals that can function effectively and comfortably in the fields of gerontology, geriatrics, and environmental sustainability at any of the intersections between science- policy-public health-industry. ClimAge will address multiple challenges currently faced by society at large as well as by the academic community. These include: the increasingly negative impact of climate change on our lives and the fact that older people are particularly susceptive to the negative impact of climate change. The impact occurs within a complex socio-structural environment, which fosters multiple inequalities and vulnerabilities that often intersect with age, including gender, socioeconomic status (e.g., fuel poverty), and geographic location. Nonetheless, the effects of climate change on older people often are disregarded. Moreover, public discourse tends to blame older people for inaction and high energy consumption. The disregard for the negative effects of climate change on older people is also present at the policy level. Moreover, older people do not enjoy an internationally binding treaty that protects their rights. In addition to the divide between the two fields of environmental susceptibility and gerontology/geriatrics, there is a sciencepolicy-clinical practice-industry divide in this field, so that the different sectors do not interact.



The Spectator (1711–1712; 1714), as an example of the moral press genre, was from its creation closely linked to an economic discourse of Protestant origin. From the first issue, the English prototype created by Richard Steele and Joseph Addison effectively allegorized the vectors of British liberalism of the time. The two journalists questioned the economic

viability of their own publishing enterprise by calling attention to the sale of

their moral weekly and the financial and material constraints they faced. With the transmission of The Spectator model throughout continental Europe, these two threads of economic discourse became intertwined. The imitators of Steele and Addison addressed the economic problems of their own time: they questioned the responsibility of money as social link or dividing force, the importance of commerce and exchange — of goods or of information —, the links between the wealth of a nation and the industry of its inhabitants. At the same time, they initiated a kind of meta-discourse by raising economic questions on the journal itself.

# Embodied Narration. Illness, Death and Dying in Modern Culture.



Do liminal embodied experiences such as illness, death and dying affect literary form? In recent years, the concept of embodiment has been theorized from various perspectives. Gender studies have been concerned with the cultural implications of embodiment, arguing to move away from viewing the body as a prediscursive phenomenon to regarding it as an acculturated

body. Age studies have extended this view to the embodied experience of aging while drawing attention to the ways in which the ageing body, through its materiality and plasticity, restricts the possibilities of (de)constructing subjectivity. These current debates on embodiment find a strong counterpart in literary representation. The contributions to this anthology investigate how and to what extend physical borderline experiences affect literary form.

In addition, Heike Hartung remarks that the *Bildungsroman*, the textual object of study here, comprises three opposing categorizations

under its aegis, all of which are discussed: 'first, the German set against the [English] (or European) version; second, the eighteenth- set against the nineteenth-century novel; and third, the male set against the female variant' (p. 84).







tormenting a society undergoing radical changes in economy and political and ideological structures, with which come shifting perspectives in cultural narratives and cultural tropes. Without presupposing to give any kind of encompassing historical analysis, the author chooses concepts that, for him, lay bare the crucial problems of a society that is not certain of its directions, still conflicted about its roots, and lost in the contradictory and often merciless present. In this provocative, playful, and challenging series of essays arranged in alphabetical order and choosing for each letter a word that serves as prompt (A for Accusation; B for Botox, etc.), the author considers the relationship between Albania and Europe, the imagined East-West dichotomies, the syntagmatic and paradigmatic transformations at the turn of the 21st century, the discrepancies between the ideas of continuity and change, all seen through a web of references from science, culture, and art. After completing a doctorate in Philosophy at the University of Graz, Gilman Bakalli took an active part in Albanian public life as teacher, researcher, and politician. He was cut short in his efforts of completing the promise of the book's title – 36 ideas and debates - so that the 27 essays in this book deconstruct its title, serve as an invitation to imagine the contents of the remaining nine titles, and embody the dynamics between constant flux and stagnation that the essays discuss.

As both parties prepared their campaigns, Noel gave insight into what the strategies for the Republicans and the Democrats were pursuing, what are the major themes and trends would dominate voting,

whether it is true that mid-terms are a referendum on the President, and what could be learned from previous mid-term elections and which possible effects their outcome could have on the President's agenda.

# "Ageing Masculinities in Central and Southeast European Film and Literature

# C.IAS Lecture by Roberta Maierhofer and Oana Ursulesku April 2, 2019

On April 2, 2019, Roberta Maierhofer and Oana Ursulesku presented the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge) at the Center for Southeast European Studies of the University of Graz. The primary objective of the research project is to analyse social constructions of ageing masculinities and/through their cultural representations in contemporary European literatures and cinemas. Applying to the cultural analysis an interdisciplinary corpus of masculinity and age studies, the project seeks to make an impact by crossing the traditional Social Sciences-Humanities boundary and by proving that not only do social notions of masculinity shape their cultural representations, but they simultaneously affect the social (de-)construction of both gender and age.



# Driven Out: The Forgotten War against Chinese Americans C.IAS Guest Lecture by Jean Pfaelzer

# May 20, 2019

Jean Pfaelzer, Professor of English and American Studies at the *University of Delaware*, USA, held a lecture focusing on her newest book *Driven Out: The Forgotten War Against Chinese Americans. Driven Out* exposed a shocking story of ethnic cleansing in California and the Pacific Northwest when the first Chinese Americans were rounded up and purged from more than three hundred communities by lawless citizens and duplicitous politicians. From 1848 into the twentieth century, Chinatowns burned across the West as Chinese miners and merchants, lumberjacks and fieldworkers, prostitutes and merchants' wives were violently loaded onto railroad cars or steamers, marched out of town, or killed. But the Chinese fought back-with arms, strikes, and lawsuits and by flatly refusing to leave. When red posters appeared on barns and windows across the United States urging the Chinese to refuse to carry photo identity cards, more than one hundred thousand joined the largest mass civil disobedience to date in the United States. The first Chinese Americans were marched out and starved out. But even facing brutal pogroms, they stood up for their civil rights.

# The Children of Harvey Milk: How LGBTQ Politicians Changed the World C.IAS Guest Lecture by Andrew Reynolds June 6, 2019



Andrew Reynolds gave a lecture on his book The Children of Harvey Milk: How LGBTQ Politicians Changed the World. He is Professor of Political Science at the UNC at Chapel Hill. His research and teaching focus on democratization, constitutional design and electoral politics. He is particularly interested in the presence and impact of minorities and marginalized communities. Prof. Revnolds has worked for the UN, the International Institute for Democracy and Electoral Assistance (IDEA), the UK Department for International Development, and the Organization for Security and Cooperation in Europe (OSCE).

# Things Done Changed: Rearticulating the Real in Hip-Hop C.IAS Guest Lecture by Murray Forman

June 27, 2019



In his talk, Murray Forman from Northeastern University. USA summarized the different ways in which hip-hop artists have over the vears defined "the real" and articulated notions of authenticity in relation to identity and persona, focusing on issues of political discourse, the gangsta ethos, and the socio-economics of "hustlin". He isolated and analyzed a crucial shift - that is still underway - encompassing the open and unvarnished admission of mental health issues and other inner emotional and psychological issues that differ greatly from expressions of masculine hardness and swagger of hip-hop's earlier period. He proposed

that today's hip-hop youth (and increasingly older artists as well) are more willing to publicly express their fears, doubts, anxieties, vulnerabilities as well as openly admitting their reliance on prescribed and unprescribed anti-anxiety pharmaceuticals. These shifts contribute to a new or altered concept of "the real" in hip-hop.

# Internment in the Caribbean: Austrian Enemy Aliens in British Caribbean Internment Camps during World War II C.IAS Lecture by Christian Cwik

# December 4, 2019

Over 5,000 Austrians were interned up as enemy aliens in British, French, Dutch US as well as Cuban and Haitian camps in the Caribbean. Among them many Austrian Jews who escaped from Nazi terror. Christian Cwik's lecture focused on the internment camps in Jamaica and Trinidad, discussing persecution, flight, internment and onward migration, and their significance for Inter-American history and culture of these regions in particular.

# 'You cannot go invade a country!' Latin America and the Disruption of the US (Neo-)Colonialist Fantasies in Horror Films C.IAS Guest Lecture by Michael Fuchs

### January 29, 2020

Michael Fuchs presented how the colonial experience and its neo-colonial repercussions have shaped modern Latin America, while the US, on the other hand, has always struggled with its imperial history built upon a rejection of empire. Latin America hence frequently functions as a projection screen and site for the enactment of American colonialist and neo-colonialist fantasies in American popular culture. Movies such as Anaconda (1997), Turistas (2006), The Ruins (2008), and The Green Inferno (2015) were discussed to show how horror films tend to subvert these fantasies and imagine that the oppressed will strike back against the American Empire – albeit often just momentarily.

# C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Tracey Salisbury May 11, 2020

Tracey Salisbury spoke on African American entrepreneurism. Tracey Salisbury is an Assistant Professor of *Interdisciplinary Studies at the School of Arts & Humanities* at *California State University*, Bakersfield, USA, where she has been a member of the faculty since 2017. The American entrepreneurial spirit is as American as apple pie. However, the top tier of real-life and fictional examples of American entrepreneurs is usually occupied by white men. This talk ought to critique the normative whiteness of American entrepreneurism and showcase evidence of successful black entrepreneurial acumen beyond the culturally circumscribed fields reserved to black business and black success (e.g. the entertainment industry and sports).

One of the simplest ideas of capitalism is supply and demand, but for many African American entrepreneurs, particularly African American women, the marketplace has been exclusionary or flat-out resistant to the wants and needs of the African American consumer. African American entrepreneurs have turned the tables on capitalism time and again by meeting the demands of the African American community with their own unique supply chain. Madame CJ Walker is one of the greatest historical examples of this kind of innovative black business model. How did she achieve her business success and what is the legacy of her business empire? The answers to those questions are

complex, but the blueprint Madame CJ Walker introduced to other aspiring black entrepreneurs continues to be used today with similar success. Yet, the question remains whether this continuing strength of Walker's business model is positive or negative for American society at large.

# The Jewish Entrepreneurs of Hollywood C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by by James Forsher May 26, 2020


This lecture was part of the research project *Interpreneurship: Styria meets the USA* (funded by the Land Steiermark, Referat Wissenschaft und Forschung), and held as a cooperation between the *U.S. Embassy Vienna* and the *Center for Inter-American Studies*. Film studies scholar and film maker James Forsher focused on how Jewish Americans were excluded from most industry at the turn of the last century. When the motion picture was developed, many saw an opportunity and jumped in early, allowing them to jumpstart an industry that was not even on the radar of most of their contemporaries. Using *Paramount Studios* pioneer Adolph Zukor as an example, the talk traced his journey from a small town near Budapest in the 1880s to creating the largest studio and theater chain in the world in 1920s.



# US Entrepreneurship in Cuba C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Michael Zeuske June 17, 2020

The historian Michael Zeuske of the University of Bonn, Germany held a lecture on the impact of U.S. entrepreneurship in (and on) Cuba before and after the occupation in 1898. Due to the U.S. annexation of Spanish Florida in 1819, Cuba, the largest of the Antilles, became the focus of Washington's investment policy in the Caribbean basin. Starting in 1842, the United States repeatedly tried to incorporate Cuba through military force. The Cuban flag visualizes and memorializes the annexation policy of those days. After all, it is indistinguishable from the flag of Puerto Rico, a U.S. territory since 1898. During the nineteenth century, Cuba became one of the wealthiest places on the planet because of sugar. Among the sugar-entrepreneurs who invested in Cuba were many U.S. citizens. Contrary to popular belief, U.S. entrepreneurs were dependent on the hidden Atlantic Cuban slavery businesses and thus disadvantaged. It wasn't until the occupation of Cuba in 1898 that the United States broke the Cuban monopoly in this respect. Cuba's sugar production increased from almost one million tons in 1895 to over five million tons in 1925. This rise in production was, in no small part, possible because U.S. banks financed Cuban efforts to profit from a speculative boom in world sugar prices in the 1920s.


# Systemic Racism and BLM: A Transantlantic Dialog C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Tracey Salisbury and Sabine Bröck June 30, 2020



Tracey Salisbury of California State University, Bakersfield, and Sabine Bröck of the University of Bremen, Germany, presented a transatlantic dialog titled "Systemic Racism and #BlackLivesMatter". This lecture was imagined as an academic response to the death of George Floyd on May 25, which had re-ignited Black Lives Matter protests across the United States. One of the many things that Black Lives Matter speaks to is the fact that there is still much to learn and understand for privileged cultural groups with regard to systemic inequities. Learning understanding are prerequisites for affecting genuine change.

# One Nation Under Many Cowboy Hats: A Fulbrighter's Fieldnotes on the Diverse Fabric of the United States C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Stefan Rabitsch July 2, 2020

Stefan Rabitsch, Post-Doctoral researcher in American Studies at the University of Graz and a visiting lecturer in American Studies at the University of Klagenfurt, gave a virtual guest lecture, hosted by the Center for Inter-American Studies of the University of Graz in collaboration with the Center for the Study of the American West of West Texas A&M University, USA. Commencing with the polemic that "everybody has always worn cowboy hats," this talk sought to (re)conceptualize western hats as significant, signifying, wearable, and thus nomadic manifestations of Americanness. Their material complexity lends itself to thinking through the cultural fabric of Americanness, which, depending on the vantage point, oscillates between dominant and arguably homogeneous permutations of predominately white Americanness, and the checkered, multicultural "felt" that is the American experience at large, and that of the American West in particular. This talk also drew on a wealth of field notes and archival work conducted as part of Rabitsch's six-month Fulbright stay at CSAW/PPHM



# Nora Gregor between Littoral, Graz, Vienna, the US, and Latin-America C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Hans Kitzmüller October 7, 2020

The lecture held by German Studies scholar Hans Kitzmüller from the *University of Friaul*, Udine, explored the life and times of the Austrian Actress Nora Gregor, who was among the most well-known Austrian actresses of the inter-war period.



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# Slavery in the Caribbean: Story, Stylistics and the Slave Narrative: A Multi-Centric Perspective

C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Michelle Gadpaille October 14. 2020

Michelle Gadpaille from the *University of Maribor*, Slovenia gave a lecture on one of the most famous voices in the 19th-century slave narrative, Mary Prince, who maintained "few people in England know what slavery is." In sourcing, transcribing, editing and trading narratives—between the Caribbean and North America, between Boston and Liverpool— these activists created the product which is now known as the slave narrative. Gadpaille presented her research which has been focused on restoring objectivity to the study of these narratives by stylistic study of the texts in the context of their public acceptability and parliamentary effectiveness. Central questions of her talk were the following: How did stories move around, from small West Indian islands, to cities on the Atlantic seaboard, to London and around in an earnest but arguably hypocritical cycle? Why were some stories better products than others?

# Ms. Marvel Substitutes Fears with Facts: Deconstructing Anti-Muslim Prejudices C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Arwa Elabd November 11, 2020

The Center for Inter-American Studies presented the lecture "Ms. Marvel Substitutes Fears with Facts: Deconstructing Anti-Muslim Prejudices" by GUSEGG alumni Arwa Elabd from the *University of Innsbruck*. This lecture used the graphic novel *Ms. Marvel* by G. Willow Wilson and Sana Amanat as an example to deconstruct Anti-Muslim prejudices through literature. The character's behavior amplified the deconstruction of popular Muslim stereotypes and demonstrates the importance of literary representation. This talk engaged with the importance of literary representation in educational settings and how it can be used as a tool to include diverse narratives in the discourse, highlighting how literature can be applied as a powerful tool in the classroom to deconstruct racial prejudices and to enhance a critical engagement with diversity and narratives.

Arwa Elabd is a PhD candidate at the *University of Innsbruck* working on literary and cultural studies with a focus on diverse narratives and representation of marginalized voices in literature. After her master's in Spanish and German in the teaching program at the *University of Vienna*, she collected experience as a *Fulbright Foreign Language Teaching Assistant* at *Bowling Green University*, Ohio, USA. Besides working on her dissertation, she is also the founder of *Bibliobox*, a project which aims to highlight BIPOC authors.

# Men are not the same anymore: Recent Changes in Gender Balance in South East European Context

C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Inga Tomić-Koludrović and Mirko Petrić November 18, 2020


Inga Tomić-Koludrović and Mirko Petrić from the University of Zadar, Croatia, gave a lecture on the changing gender balance in South East Europe. Following the breakup of Yugoslavia and the subsequent collapse of the "socialist gender regime", concerns were voiced about the imminent retraditionalization of gender roles in the successor countries. However, if one is to judge by the data on the division of household labor, in this respect the position of women seems to have improved in the postsocialist period. Namely, unlike in the "paternalistic socialist states where women were defined primarily as workers yet were also expected to serve men" (Frader, 2006), and where almost the only help employed women could count on in the household chores was that of another woman (Sekulić, 1995), recent empirical research carried out in the post-Yugoslav states indicates that men are now performing some housework. This lecture traced the reasons for this change, relying on the relevant primary quantitative and qualitative data from two recent research campaigns carried out in four South East European countries (Swiss National Science Foundation funded SCOPES and Croatian Science Foundation funded GENMOD). The approach to the subject is relational and data was presented on relative amounts of housework performed by men and women in Slovenia, Croatia, Bosnia and Herzegovina and Serbia. However, a special focus was laid on gendered perceptions of fairness in housework and the varieties of strategies by which men negotiate it and accept to do it.

# Inter-American History and Culture: Sephardic and New Christian Diaspora in the Age of Atlantic Expansionism C.IAS Virtual Lecture by Christian Cwik April 21, 2021

This lecture held by historian Christian Cwik reconstructed Jewish and New Christian trading networks between the Caribbean, West Africa, and Atlantic Europe. Several converted Sephardic Jews had been among the first colonizers of the Americas even it was forbidden for them to cross the Atlantic. The majority had escaped illegally after having been persecuted by the Spanish and later Portuguese Inquisition. The Jews who did not convert were expelled from the Iberian kingdoms at the end of the 15th century and ended up in Northern Africa, Northern Italy and the Otoman Empire.

# Showdown on the Pixel Frontier C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by John Wills Digital Americas Conference Warm-up April 28, 2021



Drawing from his newest book *Gamer Nation: Video Games and American Culture* (Johns Hopkins University Press 2019), John Wills' talk offered insight into the simulation of "America" in modern video games. In particular, the talk explored how the nineteenth-century American West became a popular gameworld for the video game industry, and how early "Wild West"-themed titles in the 1970s not only taught players about the historic frontier, but also how to play a new interactive entertainment media. The talk, accordingly, explored issues of storytelling, stereotyping, and myth-making in the Western video game genre.

John Wills is a Reader in American History and Culture at the *University of Kent*, UK.. Besides *Gamer Nation*, he is the author of *Disney Culture* (Rutgers University Press, 2017), and co-author of *The Invention of the Park: From the Garden of Eden to Disney's Magic Kingdom* (Polity Books, 2005) and *The American West: Competing Visions* (Edinburgh University Press, 2009). In addition, he is the chief editor of the *European Journal of American Culture*.

# U.S. LATIN AMERICA POLICY: From Bill Clinton to Joe Biden C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Alexander Springer May 5, 2021

Alexander Springer gave a virtual guest lecture on the policies of the United States of America regarding Latin America. Bill Clinton was the first President elected after the end of the Cold War, US power was at its zenith, and in the Western Hemisphere, after the lost decade of the 1980s and the end of dictatorships, things also looked hopeful. The first Summit of the Americas in Miami (1994) with its commitment to democracy and development embodied this optimism. Nevertheless, the less unequal partnership many had hoped for never quite materialized, as new topics ("War on Terror" under George Bush; "Pivot to Asia" under Barack Obama) replaced Latin America on Washington's agenda. A low point was probably reached with Donald Trump, who not only used the fear of illegal migration and Latino gangs as an opportunity for negative campaigning, but also either ignored, or bullied

the countries of region into giving him what he needed. Resurrecting the Cold War, Washington tried to sanction and pressure the "Troika of Tyranny" (Cuba, Venezuela and Nicaragua), with a view to changing their regimes. Joe Biden has only been president for 100 days, but at least the tone seems to have become less confrontational. However, the migration issue still seems to drive most U.S. interest in its Southern neighborhood.

# Arendt in 'America' – The Racist Perception of her Thoughts on Black Political Strategy C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Kaleigh Bangor

C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Kaleigh Bango May 10, 2021

The Center for Inter-American Studies of the University of Graz invited Kaleigh Bangor of the University of Oklahoma, USA, to give a virtual guest lecture on Hannah Arend reception in the US-American context. In her article. "Reflections on Little Rock." Hannah Arendt criticized the central focus of children and schools in the political strategy of Black Americans for equality. For this reason, her 1957 article was not published until 1959, two years after nine Black teenagers volunteered to integrate into the all-white Central High School in Little Rock, Arkansas, Arendt allowed the original version to be published, because, as she writes, she hoped it "might help to break the dangerous routine in which the discussion of these issues is being held from both sides" (45). Unfortunately, the discussion surrounding these reflections would resemble that of her 1963 report on Adolf Eichmann; instead of opening up a wider discussion about Black political strategy, the focus became Arendt herself and whether or not she was racist. More than 60 years later, the United States is still grappling with racist ideas, those who disseminate them, and the systems that perpetuate them. Plus, Arendt's ideas on racism and antisemitism are still seen as highly prejudicial. Only recently, in the Trump era, has Arendt been widely revisited in a search for insights into combatting authoritarianism and preventing further iterations of totalitarianism. Although there are clearly instances where her commentary is highly problematic (towards Jews as well as Blacks), this talk suggested that her concepts and distinctions might still prompt productive discussion of the issues surrounding of race, race-thinking, and racism, if only to show us how to learn from her mistakes.



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# Islam made in the USA: The Spread of Black Muslim Movements in the Americas and in the Caribbean

C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Philip Bruckmayr

May 12, 2021

Following the emergence of a variety of Black Muslim movements in the USA since the 1920s, Islam began to spread among Afro-American and Afro-Caribbean communities in a number of states in the Americas and the Caribbean as well as in Great Britain. The lecture provided an overview of this transnational expansion of Black Muslim movements, being the account of a conversion process to Islam among African-descended populations, which has spread - not from the Muslim world but the USA - across the Americas and Caribbean and into Europe. Further it showed how and why the adherents of an Islamic tradition, which had initially developed in and radiated from the USA with only limited discursive and personal links to the Muslim world, have in recent decades embarked on various paths of transformation, including towards more mainstream Sunni Islam, Shiism and Salafism.

Philipp Bruckmayr (Dr. phil. Univ. of Vienna) teaches Arabic & Islamic Studies at the University of Vienna. His most recent publications include Cambodia's Muslims and the Malay World (2019).

# Slave Revolt on Screen:

# The Haitian Revolution in Film and Video Games C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Alyssa Goldstein Sepinwall Digital Americas Conference Warm-up May 26, 2021

In this lecture, Alyssa Goldstein Sepinwall presented her work on the Haitian Revolution (1791-1804) and its representation and depiction in film and video games, drawing on her forthcoming book with University Press of Mississippi. Prof. Alyssa Goldstein Sepinwall earned a B.A. in intellectual history and political philosophy at the University of Pennsylvania and M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from Stanford University. Before coming to California State University San Marcos (CSUSM), USA, she was Lucius N. Littauer Post-Doctoral Fellow at the Center for Advanced Judaic Studies at the University of Pennsylvania. Her research specialties include the French and Haitian Revolutions, modern Haitian history, Slavery and Film, French colonialism, French-Jewish history, history and video games, and the history of gender.

# Inter-American History and Culture: Austrians in the Americas: The Austrian Humboldt, Karl von Scherzer in Central America 1853-1855. C.IAS Virtual Lecture by Laurin Blecha

June 9, 2021



Historian Laurin Blecha from the Vienna University of Business and Economics gave a lecture on the historical and cultural significance of Austrians in the Americas. From 1853 to 1855, the Austrian researcher and diplomat Karl von Scherzer (1821-1903) traveled to Central America and was one of the first ones to publish extensive texts about the geography, nature, politics, as well as the Central American population. Scherzer's texts are part of the extensive travel literature that was written in the THE HAITIAN REVOLUTION mid-19th century when the region became interesting for the hegemonic political players in the Global North. Therefore, the resent work examined the texts of

Scherzer as a discursive basis on which the political agents in the Habsburg Empire justified their imperial policies in Central America. The present study examined the perceptions and interpretations of the Central American region by a researcher from the Global North.

# **Digital Black Atlantic** C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Roopika Risam Digital Americas Conference Warm-up June 16, 2021



Roopika Risam, Associate Professor for Secondary and Higher education and English at Salem State University, USA, held a lecture on drawing on her experience co-editing the eponymous volume for the Debates in the Digital Humanities series (University of Minnesota Press) with Kelly Baker Josephs. The lecture explored the challenges of putting postcolonial digital humanities into practice by producing a volume on African diaspora digital humanities. From series editors who struggled to see the difference between a proposed volume on the digital black Atlantic and another proposed volume

on global digital humanities to difficult editorial choices they encountered, the process of assembling the volume raised the critical question of how "the digital" travels throughout the African diaspora, changing and being changed by local contexts for digital knowledge production. The roots and routes of the digital in the African diaspora—from Nigeria to Dominica to South Africa to the United States to Jamaica and on—offer a critical transformation of digital humanities praxis that, Risam argues, is a practice of cultural survival necessary to ensuring a central place for the African diaspora in the digital cultural record.

# Vlogging Auschwitz: New Players in Holocaust Commemoration C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Tomazs Lysak June 24, 2021v

Content creators on YouTube have turned to documenting their visits to the Auschwitz-Birkenau State Museum in vlog form. This increasingly popular social media format has made it possible for influencers to take up the role of popular historian, endowing their trips with a sense of moral responsibility. In his talk, Tomazs Lysak of the University of Warsaw argued that it is necessary to apply critical tools not only to content analysis but also to metadata and various methods of curating visibility on the platform. In addition to this, it delved into mechanisms of self-promotion and the fate of official narratives of commemoration in an era of user-generated content. Is this new cohort of popular history practitioners a welcome development in the field of commemoration?

# Mediating Native American Cultures C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Joshua Nelson and Melissa Greene-Blye June 28, 2021

Organized as the final event of the *C.IAS Inter.Reading Book Club* for the academic year 2020/2021, Joshua Nelson and Melissa Greene-Blye held a joint lecture on questions of representation of indigenous individuals and communities and their history, flaws, and shortcomings in film, journalism, and media.

Joshua Nelson is Associate Professor of English and affiliated faculty with Film and Media Studies, Native American Studies, and Women's and Gender Studies at the *University of Oklahoma*, USA. He is Lead Organizer of the *Native Crossroads Film Festival and Symposium*, Co-Producer and Interviewer on the forthcoming PBS documentary *Searching for Sequoyah*, directed by James Fortier and produced by LeAnne Howe. He will direct the documentary *The Trail of the Thunderbirdson*, the 45h Infantry Division during World War II, and he is working on a monograph on representations of the body in Indigenous film.

Melissa Greene-Blye is an Assistant Professor in the William Allen White School of Journalism and Mass Communications at the University of Kansas, USA. Melissa

worked as an anchor and reporter during 20 years in the news business covering news in television markets big and small. She enjoys using her knowledge and experience to educate the newest generation of journalists. Melissa is Myaamia (an enrolled citizen of the Miami Nation). Her research examines journalistic representations and negotiations of Indigenous/American Indian identity, past and present. Most recently, her work has been published in *Journalism History*. She has presented research at the *Critical Media Literacy Conference of the Americas* and is a regular presenter at the *American Journalism Historians Association* annual conference and the *Joint Journalism Conference* held in New York City each year.



Memory and Trauma: 19th Century African American Migration to Haiti and the Semiotics of Collective Memory C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Don Walicek Digital Scientists Initiative @GUSEGG 2021 July 5, 2021

Don Walicek from the *Department of English of the University of Puerto Rico*, Puerto Rico, gave an online evening lecture at the *Graz International Summer School Seggau* 2021 on the topic of memory and trauma in reference to 19th Century African American Migration to Haiti. What is the significance of trauma, dehumanization, and violence for collective memory? How should narratives about such experiences be constructed? For whom should they be written? Consisting of three main parts, this lecture addressed these and related questions to show how collective memories of slavery, revolution, and migration are created, recreated, and contested through entextualization, erasure, and other semiotic processes. Approximately 6,000 African Americans



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left for Haiti prior to the abolition of slavery in the U.S. They fled realities of slavery, dispossession, racial violence, and limited economic opportunities. The lecture's first part was an account of the circumstances that led to this migration. The second part focused on social dynamics in the town of Samaná, a settlement where the descendants of 300 original migrants maintained "American" language and culture for more than 150 years (Lissewski 1991, Walicek 2007, Valdez 2010). Probing discourses about slavery, belonging, and freedom, part three asked how findings from this research might support the cultivation of progressive solidarity and a more equitable future.

# Back to the Bet Midrash: Judaism for the Sake of Justice and Equity C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Cheryl Lester Digital Scientists Initiative @GUSEGG 2021 July 5, 2021

Cheryl Lester from the *University of Kansas*, USA, gave an online evening lecture at the *Graz International Summer School Seggau* 2021 on the topic of Judaism and Jewish peoplehood. In her lecture, she presented how principles, values, and customs of Judaism are neither timeless nor universal but are transformed over time through struggle and contestation. Especially at times of disruptive change, the concept of Jewish peoplehood, the core concept of Jewish solidarity, demands innovation. Responding to the present moment as a "crash," Rosh Yeshiva Rabbi Benay Lappe founded *SVARA* (a Talmudic term translated as "moral intuition"), a yeshiva that teaches Talmud as an innovation born in the context of trauma. Viewed through the lens of queer experiences, SVARA advocates for the study of Talmud as the ground of a radical and liberatory expression of Judaism. Just as the rabbis of the Talmud, following the destruction of the Temple and the Babylonian exile, replaced ritual sacrifice with prayer, SVARA replaces prayer with the learning environment of the bet midrash as the core spiritual practice of Judaism.

# Economics and Inequalities: Stability? Security? Happiness? C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Luis San Vincente Portes Digital Scientists Initiative @GUSEGG 2021 July 8, 2021

Luis San Vincente Portes of the *Montclair State University*, USA, gave an online evening lecture at the *Graz International Summer School Seggau* 2021 on questions of the interplay of financial security and happiness. In his talk, he discussed that it is likely that the answer each of us has to the meaning of these words may be different, though we all share their importance. On what does the answer depend? Is it somewhere enshrined? It may well be that stability and security are necessary conditions for happiness. Even if so, each of these

life experiences may involve a private and public element. The interplay of external and internal domains? A stable family environment alongside social harmony; safety in our interpersonal relationships and a secure environment in which to exercise our agency in an institutional setting that fosters self-determination. So, what about happiness? Are the contours of happiness sharper? Is happiness absolute (a personal experience) or is it relative (affected by other's standing)? Difficult, right? Or maybe not. Stability and security may be slow-moving and may be the product of possibly centuries of traditions and history (or until a pandemic comes to test them). But happiness could be easier to track in shorter time scales. While all of these are abstract and subjective, this plenary lecture provided a platform to think of them through the lens of economics.

# Post-Cinematic Seriality and the Algorithmic Conditions of Identity and Difference

# C.IAS Virtual Guest Lecture by Shane Denson Digital Americas Conference Warm-up July 15, 2021

Across literature, film, radio, television, and computational media, seriality and serialization have been important formal and narrative strategies for popular media cultures from the nineteenth century onward. Series mark out temporal trajectories that invite long-term integration into our lives, providing opportunities for ongoing identification/disidentification and accompanying our own biographical development over time. However, the temporal dimension shifts radically when we move from a cinematic media regime, based in the recording of past events, to a post-cinematic one, where predictive algorithms and related computational processes actively anticipate future developments, including our own desires and identifications. In such a media environment, individual and collective identities and differences (including those of gender and race, among others) are much more actively and minutely at stake. This presentation looked at several relevant examples and develops a theory of seriality for the post-cinematic age.

Shane Denson is Associate Professor of Film & Media Studies in the *Department of Art & Art History* and of German Studies in the *Division of Literatures*, *Languages*, and Cultures at Stanford University, USA. He is the author of *Discorrelated Images* (Duke University Press, 2020) and co-editor of the collections *Post-Cinema: Theorizing 21st-Century Film* (REFRAME Books, 2016), *Digital Seriality* (special issue of Eludamos, 2014), and *Transnational Perspectives on Graphic Narratives* (Bloomsbury, 2013).

# Sexuality and Functional Diversity (SEXFUN) C.IAS Guest Lectures by Hernando C. Gómez Prada October 5-7, 2021



From October 5-7, 2021, Hernando C. Gómez Prada from the *University of Murcia*, Spain joined the lecture "Genres/Periods of American Literature (Narrative Didactics and Digital Storytelling in American Culture)" to host three talks on his research project *Sexuality and Functional Diversity* (SEXFUN). The first talk "Colombia", which was part of the campaign El Derecho de Voz/s, was centered around his research concerning restoring the rights of

women victims of sexual violence in Colombia. He continued his series with elaborating on his project "Historia de Vida – Interviewing Methods", in which he personally interviewed various people all over Spain. In his final talk on "Hogar sin Armarios / A Home without Closets – LGBT AGEING", he discussed the necessity of people in the LGBTQ community to share their life stories and record their voices. Currently, Hernando C. Gómez Prada is a researcher in the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge).

# **GUSEGG Graz International Summer School Seggau**

Throughout the period of 2018 to 2021, C.IAS continued its collaborative efforts with the *Diocese Graz-Seckau* and the *Catholic Church in the European Union* (COMECE) to host the *GUSEGG International Summer School Seggau*. Through this commitment, the *GUSEGG* Summer School was able to invite and host a total of **219 students** from more than 30 different countries all around the world. In doing so, the importance of international, intersectional, and interdisciplinary exchange and discourse among young academics from a large variety of background was reestablished.

The *Graz International Summer School Seggau* is an **interdisciplinary and international program** that offers a rich academic curriculum, an intercultural space for learning, the opportunity for personal and professional development, and the opportunity to reach a diverse cohort of students by adding a different format to the already existing wide range of other programs. It is designed as an **educationally immersive experience** that offers learning both on an academic as well as a personal level and provides students with the opportunity to come in contact with other young scholars from more than thirty countries.

# Meditating and Mediating Change: State-Society-Religion

Too little, too late? How can we understand and react to the multifaceted changes that we are confronted with in our lives? Although we are frequently told that in today's world the only consistency is change, our daily lives seem to be governed by a surprising consistency and lack of flexibility. Institutions and their structures, rules and regulations, habits and routines do not appear to accommodate what we have come to think of as our "fluid identities" (Bauman). On the other hand, we experience a lack of agency in reacting to the processes that not only have drastic future implications, but are increasingly seen as points of no return. Political uncertainties and climate change, demographic transformation, continual rethinking of societal coherence in times of diversity, as well as new technologies that will redefine the notion of work, are often met with reactions ranging from resignation to ignorance. They sometimes erupt in aggression and violence against others, increasingly taking the place of critical reflection and civic engagement.

In order to develop strategies and methods to meet the immense challenges of our time, this summer school suggests engaging in academic contemplation and interdisciplinary exchange. In times of a constant devaluing of science and scholarship, taking the time for vigorous intellectual investigation is a radical act of resistance to quick-fix solutions. Meditating change and at the same time mediating change offers us the opportunity of developing disruptive intellectual approaches and ideas, as we can gain insights into political, social, economic, and cultural forces that make us believe that the challenges we face are essential, natural, and inevitable. Such thorough analysis offers us the possibility of moving from a passive position to active involvement in transformation processes, in order to become agents of change by an authentic reformulation of our identities.

In our interpretation, meditating and mediating change is the taking on of the responsibility of intellectuals to offer critical in-depth discussion in a world of babble. This is a radical commitment to academic pursuit not as abstract, but as concrete and necessary as an engagement with state, society, and religion, in order to understand the dynamics and structures that govern us as individuals, but also determine the structures we are all governed by. Such an effort makes us understand the facts and material realities, and how they are culturally represented. The program will provide more questions than answers, and will allow us to investigate the different approaches to the definitions of state, society, and religion, and their interconnectedness. Focusing on the emphasis areas of the University of Graz – South Eastern Europe and North, Central and South America – this program will offer a basis for discussing global and continental challenges as well as opportunities that change entails.

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# Radical (Dis) Engagement: State-Society-Religion

GUSEGG 2019 offered as an overall theme a discussion on social, political, cultural, economic, and individual engagement and disengagement. Constant political uncertainties. Climate change. Demographic transformation. Continual re-thinking of societal coherence in times of diversity. New technologies that will redefine the notion of work. All these issues are often met with reactions ranging from resignation to proactive ignorance, both on the individual and wider social, cultural, and national levels. Such analysis offered us not only an understanding of our own alliances on an individual, a regional, national, and global level, but also the possibility of moving from a passive position to active involvement in transformation processes in order to become agents of change by an authentic reformulation of our identities.

#### **GUSEGG Research Hub**

The Graz International Summer School 2020 had to be postponed due to the recent developments of COVID-19. Since in July, the situation in Austria slightly improved, the committee and the team decided to hold a smaller local GUSEGG event in order to commemorate such an important year for GUSEGG, what would have been its 15th year. Therefore, the Research Hub celebrated the fifteen years GUSEGG in Seggau Castle from July 21 to July 24, inviting 27 participants, including keynote lecturers, presenters, and students from the University of Graz.

Desperate times, as the saying goes, ask for desperate measures, which in the case of the GUSEGG Research Hub stood for channeling the keynote lectures, presentations and discussions to the open public via livestream. Therefore, team GUSEGG ensured a secure online environment that enabled students and interested people to join the hubs. #### Stability, Security, and Happiness: State - Society - Religion

GUSEGG 2021 will offer as an overall theme a broad discussion of the understanding of security, stability, and happiness. Defined quality assurance mechanisms and product and service safety measures are often defined as a guarantee for achieving individual happiness. Taking the place of political action and structural social change, the "imperative of happiness" (Illouz) has led to institutions and multinational corporations determining which individual decisions will lead to successful, meaningful, and healthy lives. When happiness is seen as independent of the material and political contexts we live in, then individual personal action is seen as a replacement and not as a demand for collective political agency. Climate change activists' calls for action are relegated to media coverage as social events inspiring individual measures, but not as an urgent call for institutional and governmental consequences.

As happiness has become a consumer good, the promise of an individual state of bliss has led to a decline of institutional ownership in terms of social, cultural, political, and economic measures, and shifted responsibilities from the collective to the individual. When the United 7 Nation published the "World Happiness Report" and the OECD launched the "Better Life Initiative," there was a shift from a demand for political action to the realm of the individual. Therefore, such issues are often met with reactions ranging from resignation to proactive ignorance, both on the individual and wider social, cultural, and national levels. Understanding that the responsibility of creating an open and tolerant society lies both in the collective and individual, and requires political and social agency in order to ensure structures and institutions that support both the individual and the community. In order to develop strategies and methods to meet the immense challenges of our time, this summer school suggests engaging in academic contemplation and interdisciplinary exchange. It will do so by analyzing different expectations often expressed as demands and entitlement of ensured happiness as well as the demand for a tight net of security measures, such as the European Data Protection Law. Thus, discussing the relationship of the individual to social structures in terms of security, stability, and happiness leads to a contemplation of engagement as well as disengagement in terms of the relationship of the individual to social, political, and economic structure. Such investigations offer us the opportunity of developing disruptive intellectual approaches and ideas, as we can gain insights into the many forces that make us believe that the challenges we face are essential, natural, and inevitable. Therefore, analysis offers us not only an understanding of our own alliances on an individual, a regional, national, and global level, but also the possibility of moving from a passive position to active involvement in transformation processes in order to become agents of change by an authentic reformulation of our identities.

# Comparative Health Care in Austria, Slovenia, and the Americas



May 06, 2018 – June 09, 2018, May 10, 2019 – June 08, 2019

The Comparative Healthcare in Austria, Slovenia and the Americas program offers the opportunity to explore healthcare through a comparative lens, using mostly Austria but also Slovenia as specific examples to contrast the European system with the United States. The history of the development of healthcare is explored and provides insights into how hospitals and healthcare have developed and changed over time, the relationship between culture and health, and how trends in healthcare can be viewed in physical spaces. Intersectional aspects such as health and aging, health and inequality, nutrition, education, sustainable healthcare, health and healthcare policies, and the question of political, cultural, academic, and metaphorical spaces of health and healthcare are investigated through different cultural lenses in Austria and the United States.

Together with Orin James from the Division of Biological and Health Sciences at the University of Pittsburgh, Bradford, USA, the Comparative Healthcare Project has been established as an interdisciplinary and international collobroation to provide participants beneficial insights and opportunity for reflection on the underlying differences in North American and European healthcare systems.

Representatives of the Universities of Ljubljana, Zagreb, Novi Sad, Kraków, Plovdiv, Iasi, Pécs, Budapest, Maribor, Szeged, Zadar and Veliko Tarnovo who have been working for a number of years successfully in the program gave their talks and had time over the week-long discussions and lectures to formulate plans for the next stage of cooperation of the CEEPUS Network "Inter-American Studies." This year for the first time, we had the honor and possibility to invite Prof. Sangjun Jeong, an expert on the field from the Seoul National University, South Korea to our CEEPUS Week 2018. Further external academic experts from the South-Central European region took part in the meetings, and in the context of their stay, interest was expressed in working more closely with the network and on the topic of the fast-growing research field of Inter-American Studies.

In a world inundated with fake news, it was refreshing to meet and criticize today's media, while at the same time-sharing real news about our network at the various universities and the problems facing university students and professors alike.



# 2021 CEEPUS Network Meeting & Conference "Crises in the Americas in Past and Present" October 18 – October 22, 2021, Center for Inter-American Studies, University of Graz

In the framework of the 2021 CEEPUS Network Meeting & Conference from October 18 to October 22, 2021, several guest lecturers from Hungary, Slovenia and the Czech Republic gave interesting insights into their research on the topic of "Crises in the Americas in Past and Present". István Pásztori-Kupán from the Károli Gáspár University in Budapest, Hungary, started the series with his talk on "Messianic Themes and Messages amidst Crisis Situations in Hollywood Sci-Fi: Matrix-Trilogy, Star Wars Saga", where he elaborated on the inclusion of biblical allusions within Hollywood productions. The second speaker of the day, Bea Tomšič Amon from the *University of Ljubljana*, *Slovenia*, raised thought-provoking points about "Cultural Survival During the Last Argentine Dictatorship". The presentation reconstructed some cultural practices which developed during the last Argentine dictatorship by reflecting on certain contributions using available testimonies and written documents. Mónika Fodor from the *University* of Pecs, Hungary, continued the CEEPUS Conference by giving insights into the topic of "Transmedial Representations of Identity and Memory in Graphic Novels of the Migrant Crisis". Inbetween the talks, on October 20, an online colloquium organized by The Austria's Young Americanists (AYA) was held, where emerging scholars in American Studies gave presentations on numerous different topics within four panels. Continuing with Réka Cristian from the University of Szeged, Hungary, students got a different view about Hollywood when engaging with his talk on "Hollywood in Crisis? Gender and Cinema – All Sides of the Camera". David Livingston from the University of Olomouc, Czech Republic, elaborated on "The Star-Spangled Banner, Black Lives Matter, and Alternative Anthems". Finally, Judit Nagy from the University Karoli Caspar in Budapest, Hungary, hosted a hybrid lecture on "Korean Comfort Women in Chang-rae Lee's A Gesture Life and in Christina Park's The Homes We Build on Ashes". The CEEPUS Network Meeting ended with the 48th Conference of the Austrian Association of American Studies (AAAS) Digital Americas, which continued the following week.

# Cafe Europa: "Trump: One Year in Office" January 18, 2018

A panel discussion organized jointly by the Government of Styria, the Department of Europe and Foreign Affairs and Europe Direct, the Department of American Studies of the University of Graz, the Center for Inter-American Studies of the University of Graz, and the Austro-American Society for Styria.

A panel of experts discussed the first year of the Trump administration from a European perspective. America and Europe are connected in many ways: First of all, there are important economic connections with both Europe and the US being very strong trading partners for each other in terms of goods and services and also foreign investment. There are also strong cultural relations, just for example thinking of the role American popular culture and media productions play in Europe. And there are of course political relations, if we think of *NATO* or climate agreements for example. — Transatlantic relationships are multifaceted and multi-dimensional and both America and Europe have been important reference points for their respective self-images and identities for a long time. Thus, the panel took a closer look at developments that happened during the first year of Donald Trump's presidency, and how these had affected the United States and also Europe.

Visiting Fulbright Scholar Don E. Walicek, the Center for Inter-American of the University of Graz, and the Afro-Asian Institute of the University of Graz organized a reading of the Mauritanian writer Mohamedou Ould Slahi's memoir Guantanamo Diaries, which presented his experiences as a detainee of the Guantanamo Detention Camp. When he left the infamous US military's camp,



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his 2015 memoir had become a bestseller, and had been translated into more than a dozen languages. The text had been heavily redacted by US government censors; nevertheless, readers around the world were fascinated with Slahi's narrative and his generous call for reconciliation. At the event, audience members had the opportunity to ask Slahi questions about his writings to learn more about Guantanamo Bay. University of Graz students who had enrolled in the American Studies course "The Humanities Respond: Ethics, Justice, and Hope at Guantanamo Bay", taught by Don E. Walicek, read from Slahi's works. Mohamedou Ould Slahi had been cleared of any wrongdoings by multiple government agencies, but he had not had his passport returned and therefore could not travel internationally. For this reason, he participated via Skype.

## Leadership for Europe? May 20, 2019

The elections of the Parliament of the European Union, the debate on Brexit, Donald Trump and Populism, but also the nearing end of the Angela Merkel as the German Chancellor all raise pressing question regarding the foundation and future of the project "Europe". #### In Dialogue with the United States: Virtual Inauguration Day Extravaganza January 20, 2021

Ever since 1797, the power of the American presidency has transferred from one person to another forty-five times; on January 20, it became forty-six times. Despite the trials of war, depression and social upheaval, each transfer of power occurred peacefully even when power was turned over from one political party to another. Whenever that transition occurred, the national discourse usually focused on the legacy of the outgoing president and the agenda of the one coming in. That debate is rarely about whether the transfer will occur, whether the outgoing president will stay on, refuse to leave, or reject the will of the people. It is almost never about whether someone in the military or some political faction will try to disrupt the transition.

In the wake of the events that took place at the United States Capitol on January 6, the peaceful transition of power that is marked by the inauguration of a new



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president had even more significance than it usual does. In order to address the significance of this specific transfer of power, a special event was organized by the Center for Inter-American Studies of the University of Graz, the Austro-American Society for Styria, and the University of Klagenfurt.

Following President Biden's inaugural address, a panel of expert respondents contextualized and dissected the president's vision for the nation. Heinz Tschachler (American Studies, *University of Klagenfurt*) opened the event with a talk titled "The Cult of the Presidency", which was followed by a watchalong of the Oath of Office and President Biden's Inaugural Address. The conclusion of the virtual event was a contextualization of President Biden's speech offered by Christian Cwik (*Center for Inter-American Studies, University of Graz*), Cheryl Lester (American Studies, *University of Kansas, USA*), Roberta Maierhofer (*Center for Inter-American Studies*, University of Graz), and Heinz Tschachler (American Studies, *University of Klagenfurt*).



#### "Getting in good trouble, necessary trouble": A Discussion on Black Lives Matter" January 29, 2021



# Dictatorships in Latin America: Online Book Presentation of the 47th Volume of the Historamericana Series

March 4, 2021



Volume 47 of the Historamericana Series was officially published on December 18, 2020. To commemorate and present the newest publication of the series, the Center for Inter-American Studies hosted an online book presentaiton which gave room for the insight of the editors Christian Cwik, Hans-Joachim König and Stefan Rinke, and a commentary given by Christiane Berth.

The volume focuses on manifestations of dictatorships in Latin America in the 20th century. Since the wars of independence at the beginning of the 19th century, longtime autocrats, civil and military caudillos, and mostly military dictators

who came to power through coups have shaped the political processes. The authors of this volume – Latin American and European historians – deal with the internal and external conditions as well as with the legitimation of dictatorships in the period between 1945 and 1990. They ask how dictators at that time used the competition between the USA and the USSR for their

political agenda in order to counter the economic and social problems of their states, to support or block the demands for overcoming the still existing social divisions and a lack of legitimation to replace it with repression, to achieve greater economic independence from the industrialized nations as well as national sovereignty over the hegemonic power of the USA or, for instance, to subordinate oneself to its influence with the "doctrine of national security". The depiction of differently oriented dictatorships in Cuba, Venezuela, Peru, Panama, Argentina, and Chile creates a differentiated picture of the emergence and justification of dictatorship in Latin America."

The following authors featured in the anthology participated in this event: Beatriz Carolina Crisorio (Departamento de Historia Economica, Universidad de Buenos Aires, Argentina), Tomas Straka Medina (Departamento de Historia, Universidad Catolica Andres Bello, Caracas) and Michael M. Zeuske (Center for Dependency and Slavery Studies, University of Bonn).

## Western Hemispheric Studies: Inter-American Research and Teaching March 9, 2021

As representatives of the Research Cluster The Americas: Perspectives of the Western Hemisphere, Roberta Maierhofer, Christian Cwik and Barbara Ratzenböck from the Center for Inter-American Studies of the University of Graz spoke on "Western Hemispheric Studies: Inter-American Research and Teaching" at a forum hosted by the Research Network Heterogeneity and Cohesion" (HuK) of the University of Graz.

Understanding and explaining international transformation processes and the effects on ecological, economic and social fields requires networked thinking and interdisciplinary knowledge. As an interdisciplinary field of teaching and research, "Western Hemispheric Studies" deal with current issues of globalization and its ecological effects as well as political, cultural and socio-economic developments in the past, present and future. Additionally, there is a tangible thematic focus on North, Central and South America as well the Caribbean and the associated zones of influence in Africa, Europe and the Pacific region. Particular attention is paid to the interactions of hemispherical processes, especially with regard to international institutions and organizations, structural disadvantages and international and intra-social power assymetries as well as interdisciplinary approaches in the sense of social innovations with reference to cultural and social realities. This presentation on the 9th of March was specifically dedicated to "Western Hemispheric Studies" at the *University of Graz* in current teaching and research.



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## How We Write March 10, 2021

Writer Martina Braunegger from the University of Graz and author William Begley discussed their approach to writing, answered questions, and shed light on their respective writing processes. 




## Young Adult Literature in Discussion May 17, 2021

#### Thinking, Speaking, Writing in Different Tongues: Multilingualism and Creativity June 10, 2021



What does it mean to think, speak and write in different languages? This questions served as the starting point for this event, and was addressed by Eva Eppler (University of Roehampton, UK), Narjes Azimi (poet and author) and Lisa Schantl (founder of Tint Journal) from three different perspectives. Eva Eppler discussed multilingualism from a linguistic

point of view, sketching different routes into multilingualism, as well as different motivations for becoming bi-/multilingual. Illustrating the choices multilinguals have, she discussed questions of competence, as well as barriers to cross-linguistic and cross-cultural communication, but also how we can go beyond these limitations through linked consciousness and a shared humanity. Supporting the points illustrated, she shared examples of spoken and written language use from her research on Austrian Jewish refugees in London and Kurdish/Turkish/Greek multilingualism in Cyprus. Narjes Azimi and Lisa Schantl reflected on the insight shared by Eva Eppler considering their own perspectives and experiences of multilingualism.

# DigLit: Erasmus+ Project: Kick-Off Event June 29, 2021

Organized by the Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz as part of the Erasmus+ Project Lit.Up Your Phones: A Digital Toolkit for ESL/EFL Classroom to Combat Social Inequalities in Times of COVID-19 Crises (DigLit), an official event intended to kick off the project was held. Contemporary life writing scholar Anna Poletti from the University of Utrecht, Netherlands, and digital-storytelling pioneer Joe Lambert from StoryCenter, Berkely, USA, joined the digital event, sharing their insight into life writing and digital narratives.





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#### Inter.Reading Book Club (IRBC)

The Inter.Reading Book Club is a book club organized by the Center for Inter-American Studies and the Austro-American Society for Styria, founded by Nicole Haring and Dagmar Wallenstorfer. The aim of this initiative is to bring together readers from all ages, disciplines, and professions to read and share their thoughts. In that, the texts focus on authors and books from the Americas and deal with thematic areas in the context of the Americas. Having started in October 2020, the book club counts around 60 members from Graz, Austria, as well as from abroad, including members from the USA, Trinidad and Tobago, Honduras, Germany, Serbia, or the UK. Meetings take place online and in-person every other week, in groups of maximum 10 people. Focusing on different aspects, the Inter.Reading Book Club has three branches members can chose from.



The first branch focuses on one big thematic area every semester, **reading one novel in English** and discussing the text. Additionally, members receive information on additional texts (fictional and non-fictional), articles, movies, podcasts and other media, which enables the members to dive into the topic area as deep as they wish to. Events such as **panel discussions, watch parties, and readings** enable members to critically engage with the issues addressed in the novels on different levels. In the winter semester 2020/21, the branch focused on **Black Lives Matter**, reading the novel *Homegoing* by Yaa

Gyasi. Events included an online watch party of the movie *Between the World and Me*, which was accommodated by a teach-in and discussion guided by Dr. Stefan "Steve" Rabitsch, a panel discussion on *Black Lives Matter* welcoming Prof. Sabine Bröck (*University of Bremen, Germany*), Prof. Elka Stevens (*Howard University, USA*) and Nicole Wyche Huffman (*BLM* activist), as well as a reading and discussion on Young Adult Literature and the processing of the past through such novels with authors Marjorie Agosín and Ruth Behar. In the summer term 2021, the focus was on Native American literature, reading *There There* by Tommy Orange.

With the summer term 2021, the second and third branches were introduced, offering a **reading of Non-Fiction and Latin-American literature** (Leyendo Latinoamérica). The *Non-Fiction branch* read *Caste: The Origins of our Discontent* by Isabel Wilkerson, addressing societal hierarchies in the US. The *Leyendo Latinoamérica* branch is organized in cooperation with *Wellesley College* (USA) and the *National Pedagogical University Francisco Morazon* (Honduras) and read Latin American Young Adult Novels in Spanish, with discussions in Spanish and English.

The Inter.Reading Book Club aims to address issues connected to the Americas through literary representations, bringing together a diverse group of people interested in engaging in discussions, while also providing a space in which discussions of critical nature and personal reflection can occure.

#### Transcending Borders – Redrawing Perspectives: International and Interdisciplinary Student Conference May 4- 6 2018

The Center for Inter-American Studies at the University of Graz hosted a **Student Conference** with the aim of gathering students from different disciplines and backgrounds to exchange their research from an interdisciplinary, interregional and transnational perspective. Due to contemporary developments, such as migration and flight movements as well as consequent political debates that demand stricter border policies and surveillance, the topic of borders had (re-) gained political momentum.

It was the aim to transcend narrow political definitions associated with the term and understand "borders" in a broader sense as encompassing several meanings or layers of meaning. Thus, participants were encouraged to develop new associations with and understandings of the term. "Borders" could refer to any dividing line, including national, political, and geographical borders as well as boundaries between ethnic, gender, national, class, or age identities. In order to transcend these borders, possible topics addressed, but were not limited to the following questions: Why do borders exist? Why and how are they drawn? How do they manifest themselves? How are they perceived, portrayed, and represented? Who do they include and exclude? When, how, and why are borders transgressed, dissolved, or transformed? What are consequences of the construction, transgression, or dissolution of borders? Do they draw a clear line or do they feature grey areas? Additionally, the focus was on the human actors involved, drawing attention to those who are affected by these processes as well as to those who have initiated them. Participants were invited to transcend disciplinary borders, taking into consideration methods and approaches of other disciplines in order to question and re-define assumptions, definitions, and categories of their own discipline and research.

Internationality and interdisciplinarity are competences that are currently in high demand in academia. This conference, therefore, provided **opportunities for students to develop their presentation skills**, **discuss their research**, and to **experience an essential aspect of academic work**. Academia continues to be an exclusive field, oftentimes discouraging students from participating actively in research, particularly those from a non-academic background. Therefore, this conference aims specifically at providing an inclusive, welcoming, and supportive environment for all students, in which they can prosper and evolve.

#### International Colloqium: The Many-Faceted Independence The 1821 Independence of Central America in Retrospective October 14-16, 2021

On September 15, 2021, five of the seven Central American Republics celebrated the 200th anniversary of their independence (bicentenario) from the Spanish Crown in 1821. The multidimensionality of the process requires a profound and interdisciplinary analysis due to the complex process of political emancipation with its multiple effects on the historical development in a cultural and ethnic enormous heterogeneous region. Scholars within Central America and beyond have pointed out the necessity of shifting perspectives. Many of them are based on new archival sources as well as new research methods, which also demand a critical revision of traditional historiography. Often historical discourses of the 19th and early 20th centuries have served as founding myths of the individual nation-states.

In order to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Central American Independence, the Center for Inter-American Studies from the University of Graz, the Department of Romance Studies of the University of Vienna, and the FSP Global History of the University of Vienna organized an international colloquium called "The Many-Faceted Independence – The 1821 Independence of Central America in retrospective". The hybrid event started on October 14 with a guided tour through Vienna organized by the Austrian Latin America Institute, where participants discovered the footprints of Latin America in the city center of Vienna. After the welcome and opening remarks provided by Noam Chomsky, Professor Emiritus of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT), the first panel focused on "Independency movements, restauration, and the Independence of 1821". The second panel continued by discussing "Between separatism and unification. Socio-political Concepts and utopia during the Federal Republic of Central America (1823-1841)". In the evening, a special panel event on "The Consolidation of the nation states in the times of imperialism (1841-1870)" was held. The second and third day were hosted at the University of Graz, where the opening and celebration of 15 years C.IAS were followed by Panel 3 on the topic of "Anti-imperialism in the age of dollar diplomacy and the big stick (1870-1941)". The fourth panel "Dictatorship in Central America during World War II and the Cold War" and a welcome reception by the mayor of the City of Graz concluded the day. On Saturday, October 16, a guided tour through Graz organized by Konak Graz let participants discover the footprints of Latin America in the city. Afterwards, three further panels, namely "Revolution, democracy, and neoliberalism (1979-2009)" and the "Commemoration of the 200 anniversary of the Central American independence Part I and II" were

hosted. The international colloquium finished with a closing and final debate in English on the "Challenges of Central American Independence in the 21st Century", which was moderated by Roberta Maierhofer, who guided Marixa Lasso, Paul Lovejoy, Dario Euraque, Justin Wolfe and Karl Offen through a roundtable discussion.

The internatinal colloqium was supported by the Research Network Latin America (University of Vienna), the Department for English and American Studies (University of Vienna), the Faculty of Historical and Cultural Studies (University of Vienna), the Office of the Vice-Rector for Research and Career Development (University of Graz), the Dean's Office of the Faculty of Arts and Humanities (University of Graz), the Department of Romance Studies (University of Graz), the Austrian Latin America Institute (LAI), the City of Vienna, the City of Graz, the Embassy of Costa Rica in Austria, the Chamber of Labour in Styria (AK), the Austrian Student's Union (ÖH), the Association for Research and Culture of Continental America and the Caribbean (Konak Wien), and the Association of Latin American and Caribbean Historians (ADHILAC).

## Digital Americas: 48th Conference of the Austrian Association for American Studies

The 48th annual conference of the Austrian Association for American Studies "Digital Americas" was dedicated to the question of how stock of "the digital" can be taken within the context of American Studies. The hybrid event was held from 21-22 and 27-29 October, 2021. Contributions on digital pedagogy, digital methodologies, digital culture and digital media as objects of critical inquiry, and digital scholarship were in the focus. Participants could hold their talks and presentations in "live" or provide pre-recorded video presentations, slides with voice-overs, "talking head" videos or video essays. Topics included social movements vs. slacktivism; the politics of the digital; augmented realities and the re-conceptualization of American cities; video games, American myths, and "Americanness"; the digital and the changing character of American sports; film/ television, digital visual effects, and the (re-)construction of space; cyberlabor and the digital divide separating the US/Canada from Latin America; moving through digital archives; cyberpoetry and media affordances; digital media, fan labor, and performance; teaching history with virtual reality; streaming, performances, and the ongoing pandemic; digital media/networks and ecological questions; digital media and/vs. representing/simulating nature; the cancelation of the EU-US Privacy Shield and impacts on transatlantic data transfer, data ownership, and data security; digital technologies and technofixes to contemporary ills; Netflix parties and similar remote film/TV viewing experiences as well as the digital divide. The keynote speakers of the confer were **TreaAndrea Russworm** from the *University of Massachusetts*, USA, **Sharon** Block from the University of California Irvine, USA, and Martin Paul Eve from Birkbeck, University of London, UK.



On Thursday, October 28, Roberta Maierhofer and Barbara Ratzenböck hosted the event *Aging in Data I*, where three workshops were held. Nicole Haring and Dagmar Wallenstorfer from the Narrative Didactics Research Group of the Center for Inter-American Studies of the *University of Graz* held a workshop titled "Digital Storytelling: A Narrative Didactic Tool to Negotiate Intersectional Identities and Foster Intergenerational Knowledge Transfer". #### Erasmus+ International: Teaching Exchange of Ulla Kriebernegg, University of the West Indies (UWI), Trinidad and Tobago, January 27-February 4, 2018

"Departures and Arrivals: Narratives of Transatlantic Jewish Migration" — In these team-taught classes at the *University of the West Indies*, Trinidad and Tobago, Gerald Lamprecht from the *Centre for Jewish Studies* (CJS) and Ulla Kriebernegg focused on Jewish narratives of expulsion, departures, and arrivals and discussed how European Jewish migrants narrated their migration experiences. In four modules hosted by Christian Cwik, who was then professor at the *History Department at the University of the West Indies*, they discussed the historical background of Jewish migrations as well as concepts of migration theory and explored how these concepts can be used when analyzing fictional accounts of Jewish transatlantic migration. The classes were offered within the four following modules: (1) 19th and 20th Century Jewish Life in Europe: An Overview, (2) 19th Century Jewish Migrations in Film and Fiction, (3) Forced Migration in the 20th Century: Persecution of the European Jewry, (4) Jewish Identities in the 20th and 21st Century: From Abraham Cahan to Gary Shteyngart.

"Let's Talk about Age/ing! Several C.IAS team members attended the conference, among them C.IAS researcher Barbara Ratzenböck, project associate Oana Ursulesku and Urša Marinšek. Ratzenböck presented final results of her PhD study in a talk titled "Multiplicity and Convergence of Experiences: How Women Aged 60-70 in Austria Use and Evaluate ICTs". Oana Ursulesku, together with Dagmar Gramshammer-Hohl (University of Graz) organized and moderated a panel on "East and Southeast European Perspectives on Aging", representing the ERA Gender-Net Plus Project Gendering Age: Representations of Masculinities and Aging in Contemporary European Literatures and Cinemas (MascAge) at the conference. This panel presented selected papers from a multi-disciplinary essay collection entitled" Foreign Countries of Old Age: East and Southeast European Perspectives on Aging. It critically examined conditions and representations of old age and aging in Europe's East and Southeast." 






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






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#### Statement der Leitung

Prof. Dr. Roberta Maierhofer



#### Strukturelle Positionierung

Der vorliegende Bericht dokumentiert die Leistungen des Zentrums für Inter-Amerikanische Studien (C.IAS) im Zeitraum 2018-2021. Das C.IAS wurde in den Jahren 2006/07 etabliert (damals noch als Center for the Study of the Americas), mit dem Auftrag, Interamerikanische Studien an der Universität Graz in den Bereichen Forschung und Lehre sowie Etablierung von akademischen Netzwerken zu entwickeln.

Erfasst werden alle Aktivitäten des C.IAS der letzten vier Jahre und das bietet zugleich die Gelegenheit, das 15-jährige Bestehen des Zentrums und damit vergangene Entwicklungen, gegenwärtige Leistungen sowie zukünftige Ziele zu reflektieren. Belegt wird damit die gelungene Erfüllung der institutionellen Verpflichtungen gegenüber der Universität Graz und der Geisteswissenschaftlichen Fakultät in Bezug auf den Forschungs-, Lehr-, Öffentlichkeits- und Serviceauftrag des Zentrums, darüber hinaus ist auch ein Ausblick auf nächste Entwicklungsschritte des C.IAS integriert.

Dabei zeigt der vorliegende Report vor allem eines: In den letzten 15 Jahre ist es dem C.IAS gelungen, traditionelle Ansätze nicht nur methodisch im Hinblick auf eine transnationale und überregionale Kontinent-Analyse neu zu konzeptionieren, sondern auch im Sinne einer interdisziplinären und interregionalen Herangehensweise zur Entfaltung einer europäischamerikanischen Forschungsperspektive beizutragen.

Dieser Bericht ist ein **erneutes Bekenntnis zu den ursprünglichen Zielen des Zentrums**, welche **(a)** von einem **externen Evaluationsgremium** erarbeitet wurden, das 2006 die erste universitätsweite Evaluation durchführte, und **(b)** 

nach Empfehlungen der externen Gutachter des Zentrums 2014/15 festgelegt wurden. Im Jahr 2006 lautete die Empfehlung des Evaluationsgremiums, eine Struktur zu schaffen, welche gewährleistet, dass die Stärken der Universität Graz in Bezug auf die Region Nord-, Mittel- und Südamerika sowie die Karibik nicht nur sichtbar gemacht, sondern auch gestärkt werden, um Forschung, Lehre, Kooperationen, Öffentlichkeitsarbeit und Service in einem interdisziplinären und überregionalen Kontext weiterzuentwickeln. In der Evaluierung 2014/15 wurde das C.IAS in seiner realisierten Ausrichtung bestätigt und weiter fokussiert.

Mit der Gründung des Zentrums 2006/07 gewann die interdisziplinäre Forschung zu den Amerikas (in Relation zu Europa) an der Universität Graz eine attraktive Plattform, die es sonst nirgends in Österreich gibt und im europäischen Kontext nur an wenigen Standorten zu finden ist. Basierend auf einem klaren Bekenntnis zu den Gründungsideen, bestärkt durch die Evaluatoren von 2006 und angeregt durch die Evaluation 2014/15 hat sich das Zentrum für Inter-Amerikanische Studien daher intensiv mit der Etablierung interdisziplinärer und überregionaler Netzwerke sowie der Entwicklung neuer Methoden für die interdisziplinäre Forschung befasst. Wie dieser Bericht eindrucksvoll zeigt, ist das Zentrum mittlerweile zu einer anerkannten Anlaufstelle für transatlantische Kooperationen und regem akademischen Austausch geworden. Weiters macht die Geschichte des Zentrums die Entstehung des eigenen Forschungs- und Lehrbereichs Western Hemispheric Studies aus der Interamerikanistik deutlich. Mit dem Rückblick ist auch die Vorschau auf die Zukunft verbunden, die weiterhin zielgerichtet gestaltet wird und damit ebenso exzellente Leistungen in Forschung, Lehre und Vernetzung – wie in den vergangenen 15 Jahren – erwarten lässt.

#### Wofür steht das Zentrum?

Das C.IAS ist eine universitäre Einrichtung, die mit neuen konzeptionellen Ansätzen die westliche Hemisphäre interdisziplinär erforscht. Dieser Zugang ermöglicht ein vertieftes Verständnis historischer, politischer, sozialer und kultureller Kontexte europäisch-transatlantischer Verflechtungen. Durch den Aufbau intraregionaler Beziehungen auf Grundlage von Forschung und Lehre etabliert das Zentrum nachhaltige akademische und institutionelle Kooperationen, die der mitteleuropäischen Universität Graz die Potentiale von Western Hemispheric Studies eröffnet.
