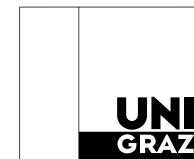




The international symposium “*Writing Emotions – Literature as Practice (19th to 21st Century)*” presents the latest theories and research findings in the thematic field of emotions, which in recent years has become a central issue in literary and cultural studies. In the course of the three-day conference, the debate will focus on relevant questions in the current academic discussion. Dealing with interdisciplinary challenges as well as the complex connections of aesthetic and non-aesthetic conditionalities of emotions, the focus lies on the process and praxis of writing as a unifying theme. The conference offers a forum to engage with the topics of emotions and writing to both established researchers and excellent young researchers.

The conference is co-organised by a team of six PhD students of the interdisciplinary doctoral programme “Culture – Text – Act(ion)”.
