

## Curriculum vitae

### a.o. Univ.-Prof. Mag. Dr. Gerd Oberleitner



Gerd Oberleitner is associate professor of international law, UNESCO Chair in Human Rights and Human Security, and Director of the European Training and Research Centre for Human Rights and Democracy at the University of Graz. He holds a doctoral degree in law of the University of Graz (1996). After an internship at the United Nations Centre for Human Rights in Geneva and research at the International Labour Organisation he worked as a research assistant at the Institute of International Law and International Relations of the University of Graz from 1993 to 1995. He is an alumnus of the Academy of European Law at the European University Institute in Florence (1997). From 1998 to 1999 he worked as Legal Advisor in the Office of the Legal Advisor of the Austrian Federal Ministry for Foreign Affairs in Vienna before returning to the University of Graz. From 1999 to 2002 he was Executive Secretary of the European Training and Research Centre for Human Rights and Democracy (ETC) in Graz. Between 1993 and 1999 he worked in projects of the Austrian development co-operation in Uganda and Gambia. From 2003 to 2004 he was a Lecturer at the Centre for the Study of Human Rights at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE) and Visiting Fellow at LSE's Centre for the Study of Human Rights from 2004 to 2007. He was Visiting Scholar at the European Inter-University Centre in Venice (2009) and at the Centre d'études des politiques étrangères et de sécurité, Université du Québec à Montréal (2010) and Visiting Professor at the Law Faculty of the University of Prishtina (2010), the Faculty of Social Sciences of the University of Ljubljana (2014, 2015 and 2016), Rutgers University (2016) and DAAD Visiting Professor at the Institute for International Law of Peace and Armed Conflict at the University of Bochum (2020).

He teaches in the Global Campus of Human Rights (European Master Degree in Human Rights and Democratisation, Venice, European Regional Master Programme in Democracy and Human Rights in South-East Europe, Sarajevo, and Master in Human Rights and Democratisation in Latin-America and the Caribbean, Buenos Aires) and is course instructor in online courses of [umanrightscampus.org](http://umanrightscampus.org). His main research interests are in the areas of international human rights law, the law of international organisations, international humanitarian law and human security. He is co-editor of the European Yearbook of Human Rights, co-editor of the publication series *Human Rights Go Local*, published jointly with the UNESCO Centre for the Promotion of Human Rights at the Local and Regional Level in Graz, and member of the editorial board of the *Global Campus Human Rights Journal* and the *Journal Peace, Human Rights, Governance* (University of Padova). He is a member of the Austrian Association of International Law, German Society for International Law, European Society of International Law, International Law Association, the Academic Council of the United Nations System (ACUNS) and the Austrian Commission for UNESCO. His publications include *European Yearbook on Human Rights* (Intersentia 2019, as co-editor), *International Human Rights Institutions, Tribunals, and Courts* Springer (Springer 2018, as editor), *Blurring Boundaries - Human Security and Migration* (Brill 2017, as co-editor), *Human Rights in Armed Conflict - Law, Practice, Policy* (Cambridge University Press 2015), and *Global Human Rights Institutions: Between Remedy and Ritual* (Polity 2007).
