Dr Marko Svicevic is a researcher and consultant focusing on international law, the use of force and armed conflict. His research primarily focuses on the legality of States resorting to the use of military force, UN Security Council authorisation of the use of force, self-defence, military assistance on request, and the use of force against non-state actors.

Dr Svicevic completed his Bachelor of Arts in Law (BA (Law)), Bachelor of Laws (LLB) and Doctor of Laws (LLD) at the University of Pretoria, South Africa. His doctoral thesis, supervised by Prof. Dr Erika de Wet (University of Graz, Austria) focused on UN Security Council authorisation of the use of force in international law with a particular focus on African regional and sub-regional organisational practice. During this time, Dr Svicevic was also a research associate under the South African Research Chair in International Constitutional Law. Dr Svicevic holds the record for the youngest recipient of the doctoral degree within the Faculty of Law at the University of Pretoria.

His ongoing research includes Chapter VII enforcement action under the UN Charter, threats to international peace and security, State obligations arising from international law, regional peace and security within the Southern African Development Community (SADC) region, and extradition related matters.

He is currently a post-doctoral research fellow at the South African Research Chair in International Law (University of Johannesburg) and a researcher and visiting fellow at the Centre for International Humanitarian and Operational Law at Palacký University, Czech Republic.
