## Course "Qualitative Methods for Gender Researchers"

This workshop will explore the value of narrative research, how to conduct it, and how to analyse narratives in different modalities – spoken, written, visual – by looking at their structure (syntax), content (semantics), and/or context (pragmatics). The workshop will also pay attention to the effects of narrative – both conservative and progressive, and individual, social and political. We will examine these issues particularly in relation to three pieces of narrative material: A broadcast conversation with Nawal El Saadawi, where she talks about her life; photographs taken by residents of the Calais "Jungle" refugee camp; and a section of President Barack Obama's "more perfect union" speech, where he tells a story.

This lecture is part of a one-off course that is enabled by the funding from an APPEAR educational project in partnership with the Islamic University of Gaza. The five sessions will be transmitted by audio and video to the IUG with consecutive translation into Arabic. At the IUG the course is run as a lecture series organized by the Gender and Women's Studies Centre that the APPEAR project helped establish.

Prof. **Corinne Squire** is Professor of Social Sciences and Co-Director of the Centre for Narrative Research, University of East London, UK. She is also a research associate at Witwatersrand University, South Africa. Her research interests are in narrative theory and methods, HIV and citizenship, refugee politics and education, and subjectivities in popular culture. Publications include *Stories changing lives* (ed., OUP, forthcoming), *Voices from the 'Jungle'* (Africa et al., ed. with Godin, Hansen, Lounasmaa and Zaman, Pluto, 2017), *What is narrative research?* (with Davis, Esin, Andrews, Harrison, L-C Hyden and M.Hyden, Bloomsbury, 2014), *Living with HIV and ART* (Palgrave, 2013) and *Doing narrative research* (ed. With Andrews and Tamboukou, Sage, 2013).
